## **Consultation Responses on the Draft Stretford Town Centre Masterplan**

This report presents the consultation responses made on the draft Stretford Town Centre Masterplan, which was held between 24 July 2013 and 20 October 2013.

The report lists all 242 representations made on the Stretford Town Centre Masterplan made over the consultation period. The Council will take all questionnaire responses and representations received into account in preparing the revised Stretford Town Centre Masterplan.

Part One: Draft Stretford Town Centre Masterplan Questionnaire Responses

Question: Do you agree with the proposed vision and objectives for Streford Town Centre?

No.	Full Representation
1	Yes
2	No. Whilst I am in favour of the required improvements to our services in terms of leisure and public amenities, the plan has a great deal of focus on the creation of residential property in key locations. This focus on residential, seemingly to fund the required development, is the one thing Stretford does not require.

5	Yes. It is a good plan like the Essoldo Cinema.
6	No. I agree with the majority of the proposal however not all
7	Yes. As someone living in Stretford this has all been long awaited.

9	Don't Know. I'm not clear where the investment is coming from and what pressure the LA will bring to make the changes.
10	Don't Know. I agree very much with the vision and the idea of improving the area, however I am extremely concerned that there appears to be more focus on residential developments. Stretford is now what I refer to as 'overflow Chorlton' and there is a growing number of young families and young professionals who require more leisure facilities and certainly need to access services after 5pm. I look at Sale and the developments there and see how the Waterside, new restaurants and investment have rejuvenated the area and want to see the same happen in Stretford. The Mall itself is an eyesore both outside and in however it concerns me that so much attention is being paid to a building that the owners have little or no interest in and that there are other areas of Stretford that are ripe for investment and development. It also concerns me that there is no budget as such for doing this, is this just lip service to keep us quiet?
11	No. Unfortunately the majority of the ideas seem to be solely providing more residential. At the recent meeting the helpful rep of the council stated there were looking at 4 hubs to make Stretford town centre more identifiable and open to residents. Three of these hubs were going to be residential. How is this opening the centre up and making it more "friendly" to current residents. We need developments like Sale Waterside (Essoldo (Manchester craft centre) the civic theatre. keeping the library and developing it further. Reducing the A56 to 2 lanes, diverting traffic elsewhere and making the centre far more pedestrian friendly. We want more street cafes, restaurants, well run bars, independent shops. I also want a community farm somewhere, with chickens, and producing local food that could be used by local shops. The premises along the road near Stretford tram station should be shops, not flats. More residential is a massive NO!
12	Yes
13	No. I agree with the renovations of Stretford Mall and also the old bingo hall on Chester Road along with the views on the subways leading underneath. What I object to is the conversion on Stretford Public Hall into a hotel. I am a resident who lives on Dorset Street

	and find the blatant disregard for the residents in this section of the plans appalling.
14	No. There appears to be too many residential options in the plan, causing a long term projection issues for school admissions numbers. The library in my eyes needs to be sacrosanct and should in no way become residential. The historic buildings like the Essoldo should be as it was, a leisure facility for local people. The whole of that site, and backing onto the canal could be developed as it has in Sale as a public/recreational area so there are cafes, bars, leisure opportunities etc. It's a beautiful building which could be the centre point to our community. I have lived in Stretford for my whole life - nearly 40 years - and I chose to stay here because I love it so much, but I can't bear to see what has been allowed to happen to it. Filling it with more residential areas will just over populate it and yet we will still have nothing on our doorsteps, which will then push us out to Chorlton Sale and Urmston to be going out socially. The Drum site should be used as a restaurant or other such opportunity because that is the final point in Stretford and we have nothing
	like that at all anywhere. With the exception of one Indian Restaurant, we have nowhere to have a meal in Stretford. I chose to live here for a reason and it would be nice to enjoy it in my lifetime!
15	Yes
16	No. Not radical enough
17	No. Certain aspects of the master plan make sense however there are aspects that seem contradictory. The biggest issue to me is the proposal to move the library, opening up the space to housing. The library currently plays an integral role of create linkages across Kingsway providing a useful stepping stone to Victoria Park. Return this area to housing you will lose its civic presence and increase the degree of separation that the 4 lanes of Kingsway give. The masterplan goes to great lengths to highlight how out date and not fit for purpose the library is, but this cannot surely be true? A refurbishment of the current building would be far more favourable to a soulless fits all community building located within the mall and I guarantee a whole lot more affordable. My concern is that the land it sits on along with Mitford St Clinic is deemed a sizeable chunk that could quite easily be sold off to housing to meet a portion of the 250+ housing units that are targeted in the Core Strategy. I would suggest that a phased demolition of selected areas of the mall or even use of the surface level car park would provide ample space for areas of housing and bring 24hr footfall to an area that currently has none after 6pm

19	Yes
20	Yes. To a point. More emphasis needs to be placed on accessibility and inclusivity - to meet the needs of disabled people; men and women; parents and children; people of different ages; reflecting the cultural mix of the town; welcoming LGBT communities - there is no mention of this vibrant diversity anywhere in the document, and an understanding of diversity is essential to the successful regeneration of an area.
21	No. The master plan does not cover the deterioration of the Mall which is being allowed to happen by the current owners. If they are not willing to make any investment in the Mall, the plan is doomed from the start. I do not think the public library or any public services should be moved into the mall. Stretford Public Hall should not be put up for sale, this is a key asset for Stretford and thought should be given to if the library and other public services could use the building. Something needs to be done to improve air quality in the A56 area, more trees and green spaces etc. Public buildings should not be sold to fund a failing private investment (the Mall). The idea of filling in only two subways is short sighted and will only make the remaining subways worse slums than they are currently. The plan

A vibrant town centre needs to have a viable mix of uses, including residential and other uses to stimulate night time activity. There are a range of low value uses and declining frontage along the A56 from the M60, which I would have included as additional longer-term opportunity sites.

	In this respect I write to welcome and support the inclusion of the "Former Boatyard Site- Edge Lane" in the Stretford Town Centre Masterplan as a potential site for residential development.
	As you will be aware, the Peel Group has submitted an application for high-quality waterside residences which is currently under consideration. We consider the scheme under consideration to closely reflect the aspirations of the Masterplan.
	BWCC notes the proposal in The Masterplan which identifies this as a "key environmental asset as part of a new Stretford Wharf".
	Although frontage on to the canal would be reserved for residents of the aforementioned development, the towpath side is included in our Bridgewater Way improvement project.
	BWCC is looking forward to a continuing the advanced dialogue with Trafford, TFGM and other stakeholders, to alleviate any concerns
	around access and parking, in order to deliver a successful scheme.
	On behalf of the Bridgewater Canal Company, we look forward to continued positive involvement in the consultation process.

	Objectives
	The Masterplan states that its primary objective is to secure the successful regeneration of Stretford Town Centre and provide a prosperous, vibrant, attractive and safe destination which is supported.
	The problems facing town centres are well known and have been the subject of recent research including the BIS Understanding High Street Performance and the Portas Review. It is widely recognised that footfall is a critical driver for successful retail centres. Increasing footfall and dwell time should be a key objective that underpins a range of initiatives to help stimulate economic activity,
	encourage diversity and provide consumer / business satisfaction.
	Development Options
	While we recognise that Option 2 - Remodelling and Redevelopment is the most realistic development option in the current economic climate we suggest that a more radical solution for Stretford Mall / Arndale House (Sites 1+2) should not be discounted as it is difficult to envisage how the masterplan objectives can be fully realised in its current configuration.

We are concerned that the illustrative masterplan indicates extensive areas of active frontages to development sites 1+5 which in our view could frustrate development proposals coming forward. We would suggest that the word 'potential' is added as a prefix to 'active frontages' in the key to provide flexibility and allow future development proposals for these sites to be assessed in the round. In addition we believe that the brief for Site 5 is too prescriptive and should be reworded to provide greater flexibility of layout and acceptable uses. This is particularly important as occupier's requirements for this site have not been fully assessed. Furthermore it suggested that visibility of this site needs to be improved by the replacement of mature landscaped features with a more appropriate public realm.

Stretford Public Hall (Site 3) has the potential to be converted to a business centre, subject to a feasibility / viability study, which would support local economic activity while being sympathetic to the architectural and historic context. In this regard it is envisaged that the car park would be retained for the use of the business centre and if possible Dorset Street would be stopped up to create additional secure car parking.

Other proposed uses for the sites identified in the masterplan are broadly supported however we believe it would be prudent to build in some flexibility to respond to changes in the market.

## **Pedestrian Movement and Highways**

In the Government's response to the Portas Review it was recognised that accessibility is key to reinvigorating town centres. We support proposals to improve the quality of the public realm and deliver more attractive pedestrian and cycle access to the heart of the town centre and subject to funding constraints prefer Option 1 – Filling in all four existing subways and their replacement with surface level pedestrian crossings.

We are instructed by Royal Mail Group Ltd (Royal Mail) to comment on the above document, currently on consultation.

## **Background**

Royal Mail, formerly Consignia plc, is the successor to the former statutory corporation, The Post

Office. Although its management operates independently, Royal Mail is wholly owned by the Government through the Secretary of State for Business, Innovation and Skills. Its services are regulated by Ofcom. Its letters business, Royal Mail, is the operator of universal postal functions through the Royal Mail letterpost delivery and collections services, handling letters, postal packets and high value (registered) packets. Royal Mail Group also operates Parcelforce Worldwide, which is a parcels carrier. Post Office Limited (a "sister" company to Royal Mail) operates the national network of post offices and sub post offices.

The United Kingdom letter post business has been fully liberalised since the Postal Services Act 2000 and Royal Mail now operates in a highly competitive market place. As such, it effectively operates like any other business and is continually seeking to find ways to

improve the efficiency of its business (e.g. increased automation) and respond to the changes in communications technology (e.g. email and internet). Put simply, the nature of the mail industry has, and continues to change and Royal Mail's real estate needs to response accordingly.

#### **Royal Mail Properties**

Royal Mail owns the following property within the Masterplan boundary:

Stretford Delivery Office, 1A Lacy Street, Manchester, M32 8AA

Royal Mail owns the freehold on this property.

## **Background**

The draft Stretford Town Centre Masterplan identifies a series of development sites across the town centre. The above Royal Mail property is located within the development site identified as Site 5. The Masterplan identifies a preferred option for Development Site 5, which would include the redevelopment of the site in its entirety to provide a mixed use development. Whilst the possibility of leaving Royal Mail in situ on the site is discussed within the document, the preferred option is identified as being the comprehensive redevelopment of the entire site, inclusive of the RMG owned land.

#### Representations

Royal Mail wish to emphasise the need to protect the above Royal Mail site from development that may adversely affect mail services provided from it. It should be noted that the Stretford Delivery Office is fully operational and Royal Mail currently have no plans to close or relocate it. Should the site come forward as a redevelopment site, then it is essential that as the site is operational, the supporting text to the inclusion of this site within the Masterplan explicitly states that the re-provision / relocation of Royal Mail's operation will be required prior to the redevelopment. This will ensure that Royal Mail's operations will not be prejudiced and that they can continue to comply with their statutory duty to maintain a 'universal service' for the UK pursuant to the Postal Services Act 2000.

Furthermore, in order for Royal Mail's site to be brought forward for redevelopment, relocation will need to be viable for and commercially attractive to Royal Mail. There will also need to be a commercial attractiveness that would incentivise the business to relocate the operations.

This approach accords with adopted Government guidance set out in the National Planning Policy Statement (NPPF) (March 2012) which advises that local planning authorities should help achieve economic growth by planning proactively to meet the development needs of business and support an economy fit for the 21st century. The NPPF also advises that local planning authorities should support existing business sectors, taking account of whether they are expanding or contracting.

Furthermore, should Royal Mail remain in situ and any land surrounding Royal Mail's site be redeveloped, it would be vital that any new uses be designed and managed so that they are both cognisant of and sensitive to Royal Mail's operations. Should sites adjacent to the Royal Mail Delivery Offices come forward as residential or hotel development sites, they must be designed to attenuate the noise impact of Royal Mail's operations, which include working outside normal working hours. For example, this may require triple glazing and the careful positioning of windows in new development. In addition, it may be necessary to manage potential adverse impact through appropriate planning conditions.

These measures will ensure that Royal Mail's operations will not be prejudiced and that they can continue to comply with their statutory duty to maintain a 'universal service' for the UK pursuant to the Postal Services Act 2000.

I have tried to contact the relevant officer within Trafford Council to discuss the proposals in greater detail but have unfortunately been unable to speak to the relevant officer at this point in time. As such, following our subsequent discussions with you in relation to this matter we reserve the right to object to the identification of the site for mixed use redevelopment.

I write on behalf of the lender and receiver involved with Stretford Mall Shopping Centre, Stretford. We were dismayed to be presented with a document that had clearly been under construction for some time without being given the opportunity to be involved or even consulted before submission. My client represents the major controlling interest in the area outlined as for attention in the Master Plan and as such would have at least expected to have been consulted for thoughts, a background of experience and advance in terms of experience with regards to the Master Plan area.

It goes without saying that our client would be interested in any initiative that can improve the environment within which Stretford Mall ("The Scheme") operates. As such we have spent large amounts of time discussing with Trafford Borough Council the problems the scheme faces, ideas for improvement and their drawbacks and general initiatives that would aid the regeneration of the area.

The current occupier market has affected Stretford dramatically leaving very poor opportunities for occupational uptake. Tenant demand is very challenging with few occupiers looking to take space. The scheme itself has been further affected by the approval of planning for developments such as the Old Trafford Tesco, which will result in the loss of a major tenant in the scheme in the next 5 years.

A number of the positions that have been put forward in the public consultation document as priority sites are initiatives that have already been tested unsuccessfully on the scheme. For example, the Site 2 recommends residential for Arndale House; a number of potential affordable housing providers have been approached, with feedback universally negative driven by the lack of space available to make projects viable.

Site 1 Stretford Mall – a range of occupiers and uses have been approached for this space, especially A3 on Chester Road. We have had some interest from local occupiers but are limited in the interest that we receive.

In all we are interested in what the council have put forward, but through the nature of being in control of a significant section of the identified area we were surprised to have received the proposed Master Plan without any consultation at all.

We continue to liaise with the council on various initiatives and welcome the opportunity to work with them on projects should they be mutually beneficial. For many years and over a number of different ownerships the question of the structure of ownership, through a long leasehold, has been brought to the attention of the council as not representing an arrangement that encourages the freeholders to invest in the scheme. We have put forwards a number of options and look forwards to hearing back on the latest in short order.

Initiatives that we feel would help the area include;

- Aid for occupiers to help them take space through initiatives such as aid with business rates, contribution to fit out etc, guaranteeing of leases.
- Engagements on proposals to reform the Head Rent to make the structure more suitable to a modern shopping centre.
- Public realm works that will help emphasise the Scheme as the major retail provision in the area, not just Stretford but in a
  wider catchment.
- Increased engagement and consultation from TBC on thoughts and processes with regards to Master Planning for the Stretford area.

We remain keen to engage and move the scheme forwards and look forwards to any response.

Thank you for notifying English Heritage (EH) of the draft Stretford Town Centre Masterplan Consultation by E-mail on the 24th July. I have now had the opportunity to read your report and can offer the following advice.

# **English Heritage Advice**

EH support the overall masterplan principles and mix of uses so far as they exist within the submitted documentation.

We do however believe that more value could be added to your masterplan process if you were able to provide a clearer physical vision for the place you are seeking to create. For example, it is not clear from your documentation how the area might be developed out or phased; the layout and plot ratios of urban blocks, streets and spaces; appropriate parameter heights, massing models, design and public realm guidance or coding to help inform future developments (NPPF 59, 60). In this respect we commend: "Creating Successful Masterplans"

Your masterplan might also usefully set out possible measures to ensure that the 4 statutory listed buildings in the area (Civic Centre,

St Mathews Church and cross base and the Top Rank Club) are repaired and brought back into sustainable use as part of the masterplan procurement process (NPPF Policy 131, 126). The use of planning obligations/ legal agreements, CIL or other planning tools could all be used to ensure that heritage assets will be sustained into the future as applications for individual blocks come forward.

We are pleased to note that your preferred option 2 "remodelling and redevelopment" allows for fully integrating and making best use of the areas heritage assets, the following advice may be helpful as you move forward:

Given the scale and potential environmental impact of your masterplan we would encourage you to consider referring major development projects to independent national or NW "Design Review" and to encourage this by way of your masterplan. NPPF Policy 62 states:

"Local Planning Authorities should have local design review arrangements in place to provide assessment and support to ensure high standards of design...In assessing applications, local planning authorities should have regard to the recommendations from the design review panel"

I trust that the above advice proves useful to you.

Please do inform your members that EH support the principles of option 2 subject to further development of this masterplan.

217 | Thank you for providing the Environment Agency with the opportunity to comment on the above proposals.

Overall we support the aspirations of the masterplan, particularly where the role of the natural environment will be maximized.

The masterplan provides an opportunity to take a holistic approach to the management of surface water in this area. A range of options could be considered including the implementation of Sustainable Urban Drainage Systems (SuDs), increasing the capacity of sewers or watercourses, storing excess water and managing exceedance flows through urban design and "Green Infrastructure".

The variety of SUDs techniques available means that virtually any development should be able to include a scheme around these principles and provide multiple benefits, reducing costs and maintenance needs. Further information on SUDS can be found in;

The Council's Strategic Flood Risk Assessment (SFRA) also shows that the area is within a 'critical drainage area'. Such locations are particularly sensitive to an increase in the rate of surface water runoff and there are specific drainage requirements in these areas to help reduce local flood risk. The SFRA advises that development should seek to reduce surface water run off by 50% on brownfield areas.

HCA supports the broad proposals for regeneration and development in the Stretford Masterplan.

We welcome the opportunity to have a greater involvement in town centres.

Support opportunities and proposals to increase residential units in the area, and this could be used to help to alleviate pressures on retail/ business units. There could be more emphasis given to housing growth and opportunities for conversions of existing buildings as well as new build opportunities.

# 219 Background

The essence of a "masterplan" is that it effectively puts to bed local policy issues and provides solutions and a framework for development that should last a generation. In this respect, the Stretford Masterplan is our last opportunity to 'get it right' for Stretford for maybe 25 years. Therefore we believe that it is a missed opportunity because it fails to grasp the nettle regarding the long-term decline of Stretford town centre.

### Flaws in the Masterplan

Trafford Green Party (TGP) has some major concerns with the Stretford Town Centre Masterplan.1 Many people are under the impression that this document contains concrete proposals for the improvement of Stretford and will therefore be disappointed by what it actually says.

TGP welcomes the fact that "Sustainability Principles" appear in the Masterplan document. However, these principles are tacked onto the very end of the document. According to the "National Planning Policy Framework" (referred to in the Masterplan), sustainability is the "golden thread" running through the NPPF (p.4, point 14), which states,

"A sustainability appraisal which meets the requirements of the European Directive on strategic environmental assessment should be

an integral part of the plan preparation process, and should consider all the likely significant effects on the environment, economic and social factors." (p.40, point 165)

These principles should underpin all planning decisions taken, and the social, economic and environmental elements of sustainable development must be considered and balanced in the Masterplan. Had they been put first and not at the end of the document then a more radical approach may have been taken – the radical approach that TGP advocates at the end of this response.

The Masterplan identifies the "A56 Supplementary Planning Document" as one of the key "policy drivers". It identifies measures to improve the A56 and particularly the Chester Road and Edge Lane junction including for pedestrians, the disabled, cyclists and public transport users. However, under "Challenges and Opportunities" (page 14), it is noted that an improvement in take-up of vacant office space in Stretford will "be linked to a revitalised town centre retail and leisure offer that also takes advantage of excellent road connections via both the A56 and M60 motorway." Yet in other parts of the Masterplan, the A56 is rightly identified as one of the causes of Stretford's decline. Which is it to be? Addressing the problems associated with the A56 is the key to reversing Stretford's long-term decline.

The Masterplan states that

"The area also benefits from high quality sports and leisure facilities at Stretford Sports Village which is located 1 mile from Stretford Town Centre."

This is much further away than Longford Park and athletics ground, which is arguably significantly more important to the town centre, being within 5-10 minutes' walk of the Metro station (which also serves the town centre). Yet Longford Park is not mentioned anywhere in the document. The Park has been described as the jewel in the crown of Trafford Borough as a whole and, if prioritised for investment, has the potential to bring people into the general vicinity to the benefit of the economy of the Town Centre. This is a serious omission.

The Masterplan selects ten sites for remodelling and redevelopment, having decided that Stretford needs neither comprehensive redevelopment nor continuation of the existing program. TGP is concerned that the focus is entirely on buildings. The sites for remodelling and redevelopment should be the A56, Kingsway, Edge Lane, the underpass and then some of the sites already mentioned. TGP takes issue with the assertion that

"The successful delivery of the identified development sites will help to bring life and vitality to the area and secure the regeneration of Stretford Town Centre." (p.18)

We take the view that the plan fundamentally lacks coherence and fails to deal with the bifurcation of Stretford into two halves by the A56.

## Stretford sites identified in the Masterplan

Site 3 – Stretford Public Hall: This should remain in public ownership. If the Council does wish to dispose of it, then it must remain in/return to public use and ideally have some form of community ownership. Given the existence of a theatre within the building, the potential for its use as an arts centre should be explored.

Site 9 – Stretford Library and Mitford St Clinic/Bennett Street Surgery: Libraries are under threat in the current economic climate. TGP would like an explanation as to why "significant intervention would be required to make it fit for purpose as a modern facility meeting community expectations". Anecdotal evidence shows high community satisfaction with the library. It should be left alone. The library would be more accessible if pedestrian lights were added to the traffic lights at the Mall's car park entry junction, and a pedestrian crossing added to that junction.

Site 4 – Essoldo cinema: This iconic building has been a constant focus of public dismay and TGP has no specific objections to the plans as outlined in the Masterplan. At the same time we recognise that it is held in private hands and so the Council has little control over what happens to it.

Site 5 – Lacy Street/Newton Street Car Park: An important principle is that the existing businesses here should be allowed to decide if they wish to move before any development plans are mooted. Lacy Street site has great potential for mixed use, utilising the attraction of the canal. But it (and the Essoldo site) would still suffer from the A56 effect. The A56 splits Stretford and the time is right to take a radical stance on dealing with the road. This is dealt with later but is essential if any of the developments along the canal are to benefit the town centre in an effective way and if the potential of the canal and Metro station is to be realised. Otherwise there will never be a unified town centre.

Sites 6 & 7 – Boatyard Site, Edge Lane; Royal Canal Works, Edge Lane: The idea of using both sites 6 and 7 for residential use is completely misguided. Site 7 is the right site for residential use since access would be opposite the Metro access. Residential use on Site 6, however, would be catastrophic, with vehicles from the housing clashing with buses and cars using the Metro car park and dropping people off / picking people up from trams. Site 6 needs to be a low key and canal-based development. It is the only site in the town centre adjacent to the canal where specific canal-themed uses could be incorporated. For instance, a themed boat-repair facility, possibly with education and training facilities and interpretation centre, and additionally even a cycle hire and repair business linking to the Trans Pennine Trail, would provide employment alongside community facilities, and would protect the integrity of the canal which is perhaps the greatest of the key assets of the area. There are already boats moored alongside the canal close to this site. Residential use would minimise public access, as well as missing a great opportunity to strengthen the role of the canal itself in the regeneration of the image of 'Stretford Town Centre'.

TGP does not necessarily oppose appropriate housing developments in the town centre area. Should they happen, they must meet the needs of the existing community of Stretford. Official Green Party policy states:

The Green Party seeks a balanced mix of housing tenures, to meet the diverse needs of the community. These include individual and shared home ownership, leasehold, and others. The Green Party also seeks to increase the amount of social housing and commonly owned housing as representing the best way of ensuring an availability of affordable housing. All new houses must be built to improved standards for accessibility, space and facilities, ergonomics, sound and thermal insulation, and energy efficiency. Design standards shall also include consideration of social factors, such as the need for privacy and the need for community focal points. All

new housing must be designed for low energy use.

Developments should also follow the hierarchy below when considering its impacts:

- 1. Walking and disabled access.
- 2. Cycling.
- 3. Public transport (trains, light rail/trams, buses and ferries) and rail and water-borne freight.
- 4. Light goods vehicles, taxis and low powered motor cycles.
- 5. Private motorised transport (cars & high powered motor cycles).
- 6. Heavy goods vehicles

#### A radical solution: if not now, when?

TGP would call on Trafford MBC to take these immediate steps to improve life in Stretford Town Centre:

- 1. Sink the A56 into an underpass, allowing a proper Stretford Town Square to be built in the centre of Stretford;
- 2. reduce and enforce speed limits on Chester Road to 30mph;
- 3. designate bus lanes on the full length of Chester Road;
- 4. reduce the number of traffic lanes on the A56 through Stretford and on Kingsway;
- 5. once the above measures are introduced, take down the railings on Chester Road, Kingsway and Barton Road:
- 6. keep publicly owned buildings in public ownership;
- 7. encourage the Mall to stay open later.

It can be reasonably estimated that this would cost around £50m – based on the AA's calculation of £50m per kilometre – see "Going Underground: Developing Britain's Transport System to Rival the Best in Europe". Too expensive? This amounts to 0.1% of the total cost of the proposed HS2 train infrastructure project, which the Green Party believes is a colossal waste of money.

The advantages of this would be to reduce levels of CO2 and carbon monoxide in the local area, thus improving the health of everyone in Stretford – especially children and the elderly – as well as to better link the East and West sides of Stretford, which are currently split in two by the A56.

### Summary

Traditionally, town planners conducted strict cost/benefit analyses in respect of major projects, the evidence of which is lacking in the Stretford Masterplan. A cost/benefit analysis of sinking the A56 underground would show that the long-term benefits in terms of health, environment and efficacy of transport links would far outweigh the short-term monetary cost. Whilst we are aware that the budgets for

local transport infrastructure projects and national projects such as HS2 come from very different sets of coffers, it is worth reiterating that the £50m estimated cost of sinking the A56 is only 0.1% of the total cost of HS2. All that is required is for this to happen is enough political will across the political spectrum.

The problems Stretford faces come from the A56 corridor, the Trafford Centre and the Tesco superstore. The Masterplan notes that "out of town retail" is one of the factors in the decline of town centres and also notes how the A56 disrupts the fabric of the community, but the responsibility for all three factors lies historically with Trafford Council. It is difficult to see how this Masterplan will mitigate, confront or undo these problems relating to Stretford Town Centre. The radical solution we have proposed, if carried out, will benefit the community for generations to come. If not now, when?

220 Thank you for your email of 24 July consulting The Theatres Trust on the Stretford Town Centre Masterplan.

### Sites 3 and 4

Buildings fall into disrepair because their original use no longer exists or because fashions change and society moves on. The Stretford Public Hall and the Essoldo Cinema both require sympathetic updating to provide new uses for these functional buildings. The Hall's life would be considerably extended as a hotel (not offices), with a new compatible ultra-modern office block alongside, parking beneath shared with the hotel.

Repairing and upgrading existing buildings is always more cost-effective than building new and we support the proposal to create a new entertainment and leisure facility using the Essoldo building as the base. We suggest the creation of a public space or square canalside behind the Essoldo and linked to the Edge Lane road bridge for access to the shops which could provide a focal point. Allowing restaurants and cafes in an open plan setting would also enhance theatre and cinema use. Audiences coming to the evening entertainment venue would enliven the surrounding area in the evening and provide regular custom for local bars and restaurants outside normal working and shopping hours. Although how to link the front of the shops with the rear open space might be a challenge.

The Essoldo should perhaps be redeveloped as a community centre comprising a theatre and cinema as these each have different uses. A cinema is a leisure facility because it can only offer an audience the opportunity to consume and watch films whereas a theatre is a leisure, an arts and a community facility that can offer opportunities to participate, perform, to make shows, learn life-skills and the crafts of the industry, and provide entertainment. All the positive economic benefits that are associated with the presence of a new cinema on the site can equally be associated to the presence of a theatre. They would also act as a magnet, 'encouraging and strengthening trade' and improving visitor numbers from hotel guests and office workers.

The Theatres Trust is The National Advisory Public Body for Theatres. The Theatres Trust Act 1976 states that 'The Theatres Trust exists to promote the better protection of theatres. It currently delivers statutory planning advice on theatre buildings and theatre use through the Town & Country Planning (General Development Procedure) (England) Order 2010 (DMPO), Articles 16 & 17, Schedule 5, para.(w) that requires the Trust to be consulted by local authorities on planning applications which include 'development involving any

222	I am instructed by Michael Meadowcroft to make representations in relation to the draft Stretford Town Centre Masterplan. Mr Meadowcroft is joint landowner of the Royal Canal Works site, identified as one of the ten priority development sites in the Masterplan document.
	Mr Meadowcroft recognises the purpose of the Masterplan, to provide a coherent framework in which to assist in realising development opportunities over the next 10 – 15 years and is supportive of the approach being taken by the Council. In particular, Mr Meadowcroft fully supports the vision for Stretford Town Centre and the objectives for the wider Masterplan area, including in particular

the development of unused, underused or derelict land for a mix of uses.

With regard to Priority Site 7 – the Royal Canal Works site, a problem facing redevelopment of the site for residential development is its topography and shape. While the site extends to approximately 0.7 hectares, it is a long, narrow site which places physical constraints on the type and form of development that can be accommodated. There is a single point of access to Edge Lane, which sits at a higher level to the main part of the site, and this together with relatively high levels of contamination also contribute to the difficulties in bringing the site forward for redevelopment. Notwithstanding this, the site is a prominent, brownfield site badly in need of regeneration and the site's identification in the Masterplan as a Priority Site is a strongly supported.

Original proposals for the site, which were the subject of a planning application in 2008 (subsequently withdrawn) encompassed adjoining land to the east of the site, now owned by Transport for Greater Manchester (TfGM). That site, with a site area of 1.1 hectares, incorporated the land between the identified site and the railway line, as indicated on the attached plan. The enlarged site offers greater flexibility in terms of accommodating new development and creating a more viable development, which will enable the site to be brought forward and regenerated more quickly. Initial discussions with TfGM have indicated their willingness for the site to be included in new development proposals. As the additional land falls within the Masterplan Area boundary it is suggested that Priority Site 7 in the Masterplan be enlarged to accommodate the additional land controlled by TfGM, as indicated on the attached plan.

The Masterplan text in relation to the Royal Canal Works site indicates that the preferred option for the site is to deliver new, high quality residential accommodation, taking advantage of this waterside location. While Michael Meadowcroft agrees with this approach, which is consistent with the Council resolution to grant consent, it is considered that the Masterplan should be more flexible in terms of the types of land use that could be accommodated on the site. Specifically, there is potential for the site to accommodate purpose built student accommodation, taking advantage of the site's proximity to the Metrolink station, and/or a small scale commercial pub/restaurant use (Use Classes A3/A4). We would suggest that the Masterplan be amended to indicate that such uses would be acceptable on the site in addition to residential development.

- I would like to point out the historic value of Stretford Boatyard in relation to the Bridgewater Canal. The Essoldo Cinema was built on the original Bridgewater Canal Wharf, and the existing boatyard was the Manchester Depot for the Fellows Morton and Clayton Carrying company. It would be a great shame if Stretford was to lose altogether its historic connection to this important waterway as the major centre of activity on the canal. There were at one time more than three working boatyards in Stretford, and it was an important transhipment depot with the railway. There is no reason why a passenger service operating from the boatyard could not be reintroduced in conjunction with the metro, and an activity centre on the canal would give an opportunity for the local community to be involved in the waterway.
- I have read the Master plan document and feel that the key factor necessary to improve Stretford is to boost the local economy. If we would like to see nice cafes, shops, restaurant and leisure facilities in Stretford, we need there to be enough people in the area who have money to spend eating, shopping and enjoying themselves in Stretford.

For this reason, I think that page 22 of the Masterplan document holds the key to successful development of the area, as it suggests a refurbishment of the office block in Arndale House. This would, as it says in the Masterplan, provide increased employment opportunities for the local population and increase the number of people coming to Stretford for work. The location is ideal for this, with it being so close to the M60 junction and the tram stop, as well as on good bus routes.

Building good offices in the middle of the shopping area, would increase the number of people in the area during lunch times and after working hours and therefore provide a viable market to support shops, cafes and leisure facilities.

In addition to this, encouraging businesses to move their offices to Stretford would also increase the number of jobs available to the local population, which would mean that local people would have more money to spend in local shops and cafes etc.

I have noted in the plan that it seems unlikely that there will be enough demand for extra hotels in the area and that developers are not showing enthusiasm to build more. This seems reasonable, as there are already a large number of hotels in the city and I understand that a new hotel, owned by Gary Neville is shortly to be opened nearby.

I also note in the plan a suggestion about building new flats and student residences. I do not feel that this would do much to boost the local economy. I understand Trafford already has approximately 1,000 empty homes, and we could be at risk of simply building more. I would, for these reasons, suggest that the first step in regenerating the area should be to increase the amount of office accommodation in the area.

I think to support the impact of this a number of steps should be taken:

Increase the amount of and improve the quality of office accommodation in the area and ensure the rents and rates are low enough to attract businesses to relocate their office based functions into Stretford.

Provide a lot of FREE parking (so that there are lots of free spaces on even the busiest days) to ensure that office workers and shoppers know that visiting Stretford for work or leisure is a hassle free experience and that they will always be able to find a parking space easily.

The car parks and entrances to offices should be strategically placed so that people walk past shops and cafes on their way between the car park and the offices, or tram and bus stops. The parking area shouldn't be seen as an income generator in itself, but should be seen as something that brings people into the area who will spend money in our local shops and services (as in the long term this will generate far more income).

Foot fall to the area could also be increased by clear signage to the free parking from the M60 and to/from the tram stop encouraging people to use it as a FREE park and ride, for hopping on the tram or the bus into Manchester city centre, or to Old Trafford for football or Cricket matches. This will increase people's awareness of the shops and services available in the area, and generate increased business in the longer term. It would also improve traffic congestion in the Stretford and Gorse Hill area to the North of the

A56/Kingsway junction.

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I agree with the Masterplan that the visual appearance of the area needs improvement. Some work on this may need to be done to encourage businesses to relocate to the area. Stimulating the local economy by increasing footfall by building offices and free car parking would ensure that money comes into the area on a continuing basis that can be spent on keeping the area looking nice.

Appreciate the master plan identifies existing infrastructure of Stretford: canal, transport links (metro, bus, train, car, cycles) and access to sale waterpark, Chorlton water park, and Old Trafford and Stretford leisure centre.

Appreciate focus on extending the concept of town centre metro Essoldo cross the a 56 and along up to drum and Essoldo through to e.g. robin hood and incorporating no. of established civic buildings and victoria park and of course man united, Old Trafford cricket etc (and the leisure centre off Chester Road)

However absence of distinctive vision for Stretford, could be bold, if a focus on the well-being and development of communities and people across age span then could link to the environmental, physical, mental and social well-being and create a clear vision of how that could be achieved through arts, physical wellbeing (cycle routes and paths), ecological focus, healthy eating as well as what already on offer. If a bold vision then can attract funding and if in sync with people in Stretford looking to the future and to on-going be able to be responsive.

Just a few thoughts: as been walking and driving around the 'centre'.

Take people - pedestrians and cyclists and communties above ground and visible, phased plan of blocking the pedestrian underpass and take people above ground. Reduce the 5-6 lanes of A56 to three lanes (people going to united -flexible traffic flow system two lanes in and then when match finished out) others can go via Trafford Park route which is light industrial estates and also encourage drive and ride (bus-tram). The extra lanes can be converted to extended pavements (tree planting, sculptures (there are artists in the area) and some parking bays for easy access to shops) and create a visible cafe, eating, arts culture (involve community arts) as well as galleries and alternative shops either side of the A56 - and not the usual betting shops, banks, etc. One leading down to canal and the other into 'mall'. There are a couple of service areas to the mall going off the A56 can reconfigurations to the mall be made so that there are inroads into the mall, creating internal and external courtyards as well. Can some of the existing frontage be converted into ecological frontages/facades. There would need to be a number of turns off the a56 road (lights) to enable local and accessible car parking so it's a village feel rather than a blockaded mall to the right and a sense of nothingness to the left (as head towards the motorway). Also why is area up to the recycling centre and timber yard not included?

Introduce mixed usage, housing and facilities - could the existing office block on top of the mall be converted into a hotel, could Essoldo be converted into an arts/gallery/dance movement space which could have indoor as well as outdoor space would e.g. YMCA be interested in having a youth hostel in the locality ... could some new housing be developed that is distinctive- ecological - on the

land the council owns say between the mall and robin hood ... and if the land by the canal is reclaimed (post office, builders merchants, wasteland) then mix of usage - and forward planning use and make the best use of facilities (e.g. canal ... barge trips, links to sale water park and activities; bike hire etc etc would anyone take an independent cinema on.

Bring in what community also can offer as well as the big stores (e.g. the demographics of the area -diverse as well as attracting others into the area) -, e.g. look to the ark cafe in sale water park ... ice cream parlour Chorlton (run by South Asians) which does a roaring trade, we have people of different heritages in the area now ... and need to involve and reflect their presence more visibly as well as get stores other than Tesco's and Quality Save/B&M( (e.g. Co-Op) present. Without a sense of vibrancy and energy independents as well as chains won't be attracted.

What's around for teenagers .... use the park facilities as well, skateboard areas, graffiti boards, internet cafes, how can teenagers be engaged and have areas where they can hang out (with little money).

If thinking about some public services going into the mall, then risk is they will be hidden and lost as if in a sanitised tomb ... so mall if not demolished needs to be creatively opened up inwards and outwards and not just one mass. Which buildings, parts of it can be creatively demolished doesn't seem to be specified in plan. If parking is restricted to a multi storey car park then in my opinion works against a feeling of flow and openness and community - people in cars need to be able to pass and quickly stop off as well as less quickly stop off - needs to be inviting.

encourage community cafes as well as the more income oriented ones, liaise with social services and local people, could there be club/dance/performance/comedy venue which is alternative (there are djs etc living in the area) to bring some vibrancy - the usage of the old deaf institute (off oxford road) or the Carlton Club in Whalley Range or the Irish club in Chorlton which have different nights may be useful models and which very much a community feel and attract people from surrounding areas (and not the run of the mill nightclubs) and so alcohol misuse etc and noise not so much of an issue as with general nightclubs and also offer days/nights across the age range.

Could the drum (no idea what state of repair it's in or usage) - given its circular shape and car parking facilities be developed and leased/sold as alternative healing/complementary therapies practice?

These just a few thoughts in response to the plan. Whilst appreciate there is no money and need to attract funding, it's difficult to know what is realistic and possible, without a sense of possible projected costs and how to develop the initial steps. I return to my first points and guess primary question. What could/would/does make Stretford distinctive and unique from surrounding areas and build on the resources the environment and our communities already offers.

I'm very concerned about the proposal to close the subways. I don't have any detailed data but I strongly suspect that the subways are less dangerous than the crossings, where many accidents have occurred. Could you please provide me with some data comparing the

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amount of crime in the subways with the amount of accidents on the roads serviced by the subways?

Of course, the perceived level of crime and danger is an important factor when considering how to encourage people into the centre. However, speaking only for myself, I've always been happy to use the subways, whether alone or with my two young children. If there is a problem with a perceived level of danger, I'd rather see something done about this perception, perhaps by improving the look of the subways and the surrounding landscaping, instead of simply removing them.

I have lived in Stretford since 1985 so I am familiar with the issues addressed by the Masterplan and have long wished for the kind of solutions outlined there.

My main comment is that the Masterplan stops at simply outlining what could be done and contains nothing to give the impression that anything will happen, at least as a result of any intervention by Trafford. Contrary to the statement in paragraph three no 'actions' are proposed, let alone key ones. In fact I think there is a way for the Council to achieve its most of its objectives, as I describe below. In more detail the Masterplan contains three elements:

boilerplate aspirational guff with visions, ladlefuls of objectives, nods at sustainability and copious smearings of 'vibrancy' a fairly accurate description of the current woeful state of affairs a section on ten development sites and a bit on pedestrian movement.

The last is the actual content of the plan and is what I will focus on. However I think the ills of Stretford predate the financial crisis and current recession considerably. Indeed the Masterplan itself states that 'urgent improvements' were needed in 2007, though obviously not that urgent. What's more we need good reasons to think that new developments will be successful when they replicate what has failed in the past, for example a market in the Mall.

Stretford Mall is the core of Stretford and the Masterplan ought to be judged on its approach to this 60s mistake which has created the problem. The Masterplan understates both the dire state of the Mall and, in a sense, its potential. It has extensive balcony-level accommodation and a large car park which could alleviate potential problems created elsewhere in the Masterplan which does not address parking.

But the real issue is that the Mall does not belong to the Council and is in receivership. Unless Trafford is prepared to take decisive and assertive action it can pontificate as much as it likes about remodelling and 'a wider mix of uses.' Nothing will happen. As a result the 'community facilities' cannot be moved there and the Council will have to continue to maintain the Library and the NHS the Health Centre.

The Essoldo is also not owned by Trafford so ideas for this are also unlikely to come to fruition, as history shows.

In contrast Stretford Public Hall and much of the Lacy Street site are owned by the Council or other public bodies. If Trafford were

committed to achieving something they should bring forward and implement concrete schemes to achieve the Masterplan for these two sites. This covers both proposed sites for the putative hotel and also involves a landmark building. The Masterplan objectives could in fact be largely met by an ambitious council-led redevelopment/improvement of these areas, the tram stop, sites 4a and 4b and the two sites comprising 'Stretford Wharf'. This should include providing a home for the library and health centre and attractive retail and cafe/restaurant facilities.

The Mall would have to react to this in the best way it could if it cannot be persuaded to move forward in line with the Masterplan.

The section on pedestrian movement is illogical. Why should replacing 2 subways be successful when replacing 4 'will not deliver the transformation necessary.' Something much bolder is needed to provide access. Under the Masterplan two street crossings will be necessary to get from the trams stop to the Mall. Since both are dual carriageways I imagine that will mean 4 separate waits at crossings. Surely the tram stop could be linked to the canal and provide safe pedestrian access to the proposed Lacy Street redevelopment and from there to Chester Road south of Edge Lane? This fits well with my suggestion above. There is little in the Masterplan on the creation of canal-side public spaces.

Finally the Council might like to review its 17 Masterplan objectives on page 5. Some are met, but many are not. There is no way the musings on the options for the 10 sites will create 'a strong sense of place.' There is not much on improving 'key gateways', the balance of housing types, attracting visitors, the Trans Pennine Trail, air quality, cycling routes, safety and security (beyond filling in two underpasses) or 'reducing economic deprivation within the surrounding area.' These omissions suggest Trafford have some way to go to creating a coherent plan with some hope of successful implementation.

When I first saw the objectives of the Masterplan, I thought it was so hopeful, and was bitterly disappointed by the plan, which does not seek to address the objectives

It really felt as if the solution proposed in the plan were written by somebody else. The whole of the preamble is about developing the leisure and evening economy, and yet eight of the 10 sites are earmarked for residential, including former retail units, a pub, and a library.

There is no attempt to address the need to develop attractive pedestrian and cycle routes in the plan, even though it is on the vision.

The gateways of the town centre are not identified at all. What are they, and how will they be enhanced?

The objective bullet point 8 proposes a "better balance of housing types" and it is the first time this is mentioned- better than what? What is the deficiency?

Nothing said about how the air quality on the A56 will be improved.

The Essoldo is mentioned as an area of intervention. I do hope this means CPO.

What is the opportunity to intervene in the Mall? The Council takes funds from it. Why can't those be re-invested in a partnership approach?

Why demolish the Library? It is a beautiful building. If the health facility and library are put into the Mall, when it closes, so do they. The Council will lose control over how these work. If the Mall fails- then do we lose the Library and Health facility?

It will not be possible to make the A56 frontage of the Mall a nice place for cafes and restaurants- when it is just a bleak traffic run.

The Civic Hall would make a wonderful hotel/restaurant. We have no public space in Stretford. Nowhere to hold a wedding/party/conference on a small scale.

What can the Council do to encourage the types of retail into Stretford that we long to see?

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How can the management of the Mall be encouraged to listen to and work with their customers?

Who owns/manages the Mall surface car park? Why are there charges there when Tesco at Gorse Hill has a free car park?

At the current vacancy rate in the Mall (20% is quoted in the plan) the plan cannot take 10 years to implement. If something is not done very soon, then we will lose what we have. The Council needs to take this more seriously, and put money/resources behind the plan. It seems to be able to fund schemes in other areas. Why not Stretford?

I do hope these comments will be taken on board. At the moment, Stretford people are spending their cash in Chorlton. We need that money back in our community, please!

Stretford residents are proud and passionate about their area and would welcome the opportunity of having a fully functional (one place suits all) shopping area. We don't all want to shop at Asda, the Trafford Centre or travel into Manchester. There are many elderly residents who rely greatly on Stretford Mall for their daily needs. But over the years, the Arndale has become drab and unloved, with many shop units now vacant it's lost its spark! Give the Arndale and its users their sparkle back. We need a good selection of shops, coffee bars, and maybe even a couple of restaurants.

The Arndale (sorry Mall!) needs a revamp on the outside too, again many of the units on Chester Road are empty, why not offer the units out at a reduced price, give people the chance to earn a living without having to pay over the top rents.

Maybe a crèche, so when shopping in the centre, children can be entertained and cared for, making the visit pleasurable for shoppers and children alike.

After 5.30pm, apart from the odd pub and several take-way's open, Stretford is like a ghost town, bring it back to life, please.

230 Let's face it You've let us down for decades. Investing in Hale, Sale, Altrincham even Partington.

We live near two world class sporting venues Yet you can't get a decent meal.

We need restaurants pubs and amenities for the community. Any attempt to just build housing on the canal bank is just ridiculous.

I know you have a target to build more houses. Build them in Hale. We want Amenities.

You cannot have a master plan Without having the mall on the table. Can you consider buying it and taking it back into public ownership?

These are the mistakes you made in the 70s it's about time to put them right now.

You compulsory purchase things in Altrincham, Why not Stretford.

In sum, we need more amenities.

We need a decent pub, decent restaurants, decent wine bars, like every other Town has.

The mall and its management Are a disaster. Buy it back

Further to the Masterplan document and various discussions verbally and social media, I would like to provide some input into the plans, as I am away during the public meeting. I would like to be kept informed of future dates, as I feel very passionately about being involved going forward.

I am thrilled that the document contains a very honest appraisal of Stretford town centre as it stands today and I fully support the ideas going forward.

I agree with the boundary for the masterplan - the true heart of Stretford.

I would like to draw your attention to the drawings that Jack Calvert has put on Facebook, they are fantastic and have welcomes some really positive responses (I have also attached them).

I particular, I love his ideas for the Drum area. What a great way to get the local community, particularly that estate, involved in green issues.

I also love his ideas for the Mall, I had similar ideas myself of creating outside paths that lead inside (with the roof lifted along these paths) to create an eternal feel that could remain open into the evening. The key issue is the largest area/building in Stretford is closed after 5:30pm, creating a dead town in the evening. This needs to be open.

I am particularly keep for more independent retailers to be encouraged into the area - grocers, deli's, butchers, florists etc - perhaps a weekly market.

I also agree that we need to exploit our canal and Jack has looked at this and you yourselves have. Something similar to Sale waterside would be brilliant.

I currently go to Urmston or Chorlton for a night out, I would love to be able to do that in Stretford!

I also had an idea to set up a Trafford youth zone - possibly in the Essoldo building if we were looking at something smaller scale - but what a fantastic opportunity to keep our young people entertained in the evenings, it would require some investment to develop it (but we could get local large companies to invest (it's in their interest), such as Kellogg's, LCCC, Manchester United, etc) but then most of the funding comes from fundraising and grants and trusts so not a financial burden for the council. It would also bring the youth of neighbouring Urmston etc, giving some life to Stretford for the young people in the evenings. This is the link to Wigan youth zone - you can see it's brilliant.

- I have been unable to attend any of the meetings, but am in total agreement that something needs to be done with this part of Stretford, we have been neglected for so many years, however, I think you may be trying when it's already too late.
- Having attended the meeting held at St. Matthews on Monday 16th September, I wish to make the following observations and remarks:
  - Firstly, there does not appear to be a budget for this masterplan which does make me wonder how the whole thing is ever going to get off the ground.
  - Secondly, I am concerned that the plans include buildings such as the Essoldo and the Drum that are not actually owned by those creating the "Stretford Masterplan". This makes me feel that this plan is really just a dream. How do we plan to acquire these buildings? They are owned by individuals who will simply sell to the highest bidder without any regard for what the residents of Stretford want. Do you have the money to buy them?
  - I am extremely alarmed to hear that there is a possibility of the Drum being converted into a drive-through McDonalds highly inappropriate for the entrance to a residential estate that already has a loan-type company there!! A drive through will cause huge

amounts of problems with traffic in that area (particularly on match days) as well as causing potential traffic issues for the residents of that estate; the potential mess and anti-social behaviour that this sort of establishment could attract are another concern. A McDonalds is hardly the kind of establishment that you would want in an area that you are actually trying to improve the look and feel of.

- Whilst the council may not have control over the rates in the Mall, these are still very high and are behind the reason we are losing so many good businesses from the centre. Dorothy Perkins/Argos amongst others have already left and now Wilkos are leaving all great shops providing Stretford with the kind of things shoppers want are being allowed to vacate the Mall while being replaced by tacky, useless pound shops. This sort of business gives a bad impression and is hardly going to attract new, more worthwhile businesses into the area.
- On the back of this, increasing the number of residential areas will not be attractive to anyone who may consider moving to the area when they see that there are no facilities or services available to them other than the ever-increasing number of pound shops and loan providers.
- As for building over the Lacy Street car park this very short sighted idea. This is very heavily used, it means that the residents on the Meadows estate do not have to deal with vehicles clogging up their streets AND if you do manage to develop the Essoldo into some kind of leisure facility, good parking will be needed and the car park on Lacy Street would be very useful in this instance.
- The library must remain where it is. Moving it into the Mall would mean that it would be limited to the opening hours offered by the Mall and would therefore be less accessible to users. Also, libraries can ill-afford to pay large amounts of money in the form of the kind of rates charged by the Mall. The library is service, not a business.
- Finally, it was mentioned at the meeting that the accommodation over the Mall may be given over to student accommodation. Stretford is a community that consists of mainly families and the elderly, students are transient and would not see Stretford as their home- they would therefore not treat it as such and this would lead to issues in terms of mess etc. Also, sadly students do attract crime to an area as they are viewed as vulnerable and naive with quantities of valuable possessions attractive to the criminal all in one place.

Like many of the residents of Stretford, I have been saddened to see its decline over the years that I have lived here and I would like to see improvements made to the area, making it a more attractive and pleasant place to live. I feel, however that we have to be realistic and not allow greedy individuals to take advantage of our situation which could make things much worse for the area - an example being McDonalds. Residents of Streford need some nice cafes and bars to go to, better leisure facilities and less of these horrible businesses that rake in the money but do nothing for the environment. Other surrounding areas have managed to do this, let us be part of that.

We have lived in Stretford since the early seventies at three addresses, in Hillingdon Rd since 1977, we always said that we would never move, this is our home and we have a lovely house, but just recently our thoughts have changed with the type of people moving into the area. Three properties house Black cabs in their drives which protrude onto the pavement, a house at the Kings Rd end has been extended and the garden area now has room for 7 taxis, a similar amount of cars share the pavement outside on the bend where drivers leave their own cars to take out a taxi! It is now a hazard getting in & out of our road at this end. (Planning permission?!)

We might have to consider a move towards Urmston which is a TOWN once more.

Stretford is just a mish mash of buildings some particular eyesores are the Bass Drum pub and the ugly Essoldo and the flats at the start of Edge lane leading up to the Canal & Metro. Outsiders passing along Chester road must see this area as a ghetto. The shopping precinct is in fast decline not long before Tesco goes, yes we get an Aldi but lose a good outlet in Wilkinsons! The subway built at the same time is in need of a major revamp. The Canal has recently improved its access to walkers & cyclists and the opposite side has had a clean-up perhaps for Metro parking? Then there is the scruffy boatyard! How about a Pub here like the one in Sale? And a mooring point on the canal. There is not a pub in Stretford where one would take visiting family or friends, it has to be Urmston or bohemian Chorlton with its London prices. Thankfully we still have Longford Park where our children and grandchildren grew up, why has it taken so long to get a café? I only hope they can survive the winter. One plus for living in Trafford is that it has the best cleansing department in Manchester, well done.

For me the critical mass of Stretford town centre is what I will refer to as the 'golden triangle' of the Mall, Chester Rd, Barton Rd and 236 Kingsway/Edge Lane. We need to do everything in our power to open up the Mall both physically and to the evening/night time economy. We need to attract more local and independent or specialist shops with maybe one or two small scale supermarkets for people who don't have transport to get to the megastores and retail parks. We need to open up the areas around particularly Edge Lane, canalside for bars, cafes and restaurants for the evening economy. New residential should be just outside this 'golden triangle' with easier pedestrian/cyclist access into it. Ideally the A56 should be a subway with ground level pedestrian access to the Mall. This may be unrealistic due to cost and disruption so the next best option would be a large (street wide) pedestrian & cycle crossing designed to keep them well away from the traffic with a good deal of priority given to pedestrians. We should talk to the owner of the Essoldo to try and persuade him to convert it into a fitness/family centre. The public Hall should go back to its original (community) use as a meeting house, possibly incorporating the library and place of local history, art house cinema and tea room. In this case the existing library building could be privately developed as (Wetherspoons style pub/restaurant). We should also try to incorporate Victoria and Longford Parks, the Bridgewater canal and Stretford Meadows to promote nature, conservation and Health walks. Most of all we need to involve businesses, community groups, schools and individuals to invest in this project and make it happen.

To help save the mall at least allow people to walk their bikes in there and provide places to park bikes inside.

To save the area try embracing the canal network access to it rather than maintaining high brick walls. The canal is well used by walkers and cyclists now and is nothing like the anti-social rat run it used to be.

#### STRETFORD LIBRARY 237

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Whatever its architectural merit, Stretford Library is a landmark building of some quality, contrasting with the rest of the architectural wilderness and town planning disaster area which we call our town centre. Local people are fond of the Library building and it should not be sacrificed to make way for more featureless mediocrity. Furthermore, if the facilities are moved into the Precinct (not the "Mall", which is planner-speak, being pronounceable in several different ways and therefore being popularly avoided as terminology in favour of the much more pronounceable term "Precinct"), those facilities will be dumbed-down, minimalized and spoilt as has happened

already for example in the case of Urmston Library.

Mitford Street Clinic buildings should be replaced with greenery, nicely setting-off our cherished Library - cherished by us, that is, if not by the Council.

### TRANSPORT LINKS

### Network Rail, Trafford Park

I was surprised that no mention has been made of the train service available at Trafford Park Station, close to a great many Stretford households. There should be a Council aspiration, communicated loudly to TfGM, to improve that fast link to the city centre and to various transport hubs. Demand a 10 minute frequency throughout the day. And signpost and publicise it properly.

#### Metrolink

Demolish that eyesore which was once Stretford Station booking office. Replace it with a glass parapet to show off the multi-million pound transport investment, not hide it. Relocate the businesses into nearby vacant Essoldo retail units.

Erect a large sign above the glass parapet, and/or on the glass itself, saying "TRAMS to Manchester and other parts".

Drastically improve the signposting, both highway and pedestrian, both to the tram stop from the surrounding area, and to local attractions, such as they are, from the tram stop.

Better signposting into the Precinct was mentioned in the presentation - the same applies to the tram service.

"Overflowing trams" is no excuse for complacency. We pay for that transport service. We need to be able to get on it reliably. Insist on capacity being increased to meet demand, and then keep stoking up that demand. Stretford needs the labour force mobility which strong transport links provide, enabling businesses to attract a wider range of staff from a wider area, and enabling Stretford people to seek employment further away. The same applies to economic activity generally. Don't be downbeat. Demand better. This is one real way to reduce unemployment. Altrincham Interchange enhancements will pile even more people onto the trams, making it even harder for Stretford people to get on them. Please do something about it.

Ask for a bay platform at Stretford so that Manchester-bound trams can start their journeys there. It is justifiable. And campaign for an additional stop serving Gorse Hill. Such an additional stop would be equivalent to extending Metrolink, but at much lower cost.

Push for integrated ticketing, thus encouraging linkages with bus services. All of this is hugely relevant to the economic vitality of Stretford now and in the future.

#### Canal

Encourage the establishment of a water-bus service from the projected Stretford Wharf to, say, Castlefield, Dunham or Lymm.

### Cycling

Encourage the introduction of a cycle-hire service based at or near Stretford tram stop for promoting cycling into the Mersey Valley and Trans Pennine Trail and along the canal.

#### **ESSOLDO**

Turn it into a Weatherspoons, with a beer garden area at the back, fronting onto the canal.

#### **CONCLUDING REMARKS**

Stretford is hollow. Pleasant surroundings with a rotten core, a core mostly made up of that horrible Precinct mated with whole rows of buildings rudely showing their backsides to us - King Street, Jackson Street, Pinnington Lane, Lacy Street, Nelson Street, Cross Street, Raleigh Street. What does that do to our civic pride?

As there's apparently no money available for drastic improvements, we will just have to put up with the mess won't we. But please demand improvements of the sort which I've outlined above.

Public consultation is obviously an essential first step along with subsequent open engagement with key stakeholders. I have some experience in these processes - feel free to have a look at my website:

Here are my personal thoughts - I represent no group, organisation or business in Trafford.

- 1. No representations of any views or stated positions from any members of Stretford Town Centre Partnership (particularly Stretford Mall, Peel Holdings, Atlas Bathrooms or the owners of the Essoldo and the Bass Drum. Maybe the neglected Essoldo should just be discounted as a distraction. Surely we must know the positions of these organisations (and others) if we are to collaborate effectively in producing a realistic shared vision and workable 'masterplan'?
- 2. Disposal of the Town Hall and Public Library.

Having admitted that the council may be unable to prevent the Bass Drum being developed in a manner many feel contradict residents wishes what hope is there of influencing the owners of other key assets on which any plan depends? It would seem the area is being held back by the neglect of privately owned assets and in such circumstances I feel it is vital for residents to feel they have a stake in at least one landmark asset in the town.

I feel Stretford Public Hall and Library are vital symbols of Stretford's identity and with facilities and resources aimed more at engaging the public (arts, history, events, classes etc). I think residents need at least one building they can be proud of where they feel at the heart of their community. Currently the public have infrequent engagement with Public Hall and if the council feel able to dispose of the asset as a hotel then surely a more publicly focused role (as was originally intended) would serve the community far better and help to make the town more of a destination. Surely better than being a transient bolt hole for business users and visiting sports fans. The Hall is high profile and ideally situated to attract visitors 'Mallside'.

3. Night-time economy. Considering Stretford has a greater concentration of centrally located residential property and a sizable elderly

population I think the town is less suited to a 'night-time' economy than other areas with younger, more affluent populations and more attractive centres such as Altrincham or Sale. The night time economies of either are hardly thriving and Stretford has enough antisocial behaviour as it is.

- 4. I do think concentrating efforts on developing a more family orientated day-time economy is worth pursuing however. Cafes/restaurants and other centrally associated leisure facilities.
- 5. Would a Mall based leisure centre not attract more users and increase retail footfall more effectively than the Longford Park facility? It would certainly provide an attractive leisure focus if positioned along the under-utilised A56 side of the mall.
- 6. I think the service access opening (between Job Centre & RBS) could make an attractive access/focal point for entering the mall and potentially attractive square for cafe/leisure/restaurant offers. If not then the main access by O'Briens certainly needs a bolder entrance.
- 7. Lacy St car park is well used now and would be in greater demand with increased retail and leisure activity. Visitors need parking, save money and leave as is.
- 8. Reduce A56 speed limit to 30mph (or at least add warning camera to manage 40 limit) reducing noise, pollution, safer for pedestrians, cyclists and making it less stressful for residents and visitors joining the A56 and giving them more time to exit and utilise Stretford's local retail and leisure facilities. One of the most dangerous areas for cyclists in the UK:

- 9. Any future residential developments to provide adequate parking.
- 10. Cohesive signage program and identity linking facilities and attractions with access routes and parking. Associated nature/history trail
- 11. I do like the canal side sites (maybe better for residential with very limited leisure), not so sure about access and congestion issues though.
- Great that Stretford is being considered Too much of the plan set aside for housing Not enough detail in the plan or at the meetings about how and if retail / leisure/ entertainment can be attracted to the mall or the canal side What is the overall budget for the plan As soon as possible carry out aesthetic improvements such as trees etc

I don't see any benefit of moving services inside the mall such as the library, I'm opposed to that idea, it puts more of Stretford inside the mall ( which I think is the issue)

Would welcome part demolition of the mall and plans to make it outward facing

Would focus on improving units around the tram stop Also improvements such as removal of railings on Urmston Lane and Barton road to open up access to shops on this parade of shops (outside of the mall)

Include Longford park in plans

240 General

Some issues facing Stretford which could easily be addressed:

Landscaping - public spaces could be improved -Landscape Architects would be a good start.

Maintenance -outdoor spaces require maintenance subways perfect example - by allowing all the plants to grow removes important sight lines increasing perception that subways are dirty or unsafe.

Consistency - the look of Stretford Mall juxtaposed against brick buildings doesn't work -needs a facelift - brick cladding with stick on copings.

Signage - this needs to be curtailed - billboards and shop window adverting should be reduced. Shop Banners require some consistency regarding position and dimensions

#### Sites:

Site 1 - Don't agree with the implied: larger convenience store - the current mix is appealing a Tesco/Asda Mega mega store would again reduce character and perhaps be unwelcome.

Restaurants and cafes along Chester road - can't imagine this would work the position is unappealing. Chennai Dosa woks because its niche South Indian cuisine and people are prepared to travel for it. Lacy Street facing canal might work.

Site 2 Arndale House- some good ideas here. Yes to refurbishing it!

Site 3. Again good ideas.

Site 4: Definite Yes here - would be a good attraction.

Site 4: Again some good ideas but the idea of landmark building might be missing the point -Stretford already has some nice buildings which need to be brought to life. I think this would be nice area to turn into a landscaped area with mixed uses. Restaurant/cafes facing the canal -nice landscaped approach and perhaps buildings for small independent traders.

Site 6: This land would be much better used than residential. The boatyard is an ideal place for a meeting place prior to hopping into town or arriving to the cinema. "I'll meet you at the boatyard"! Small cafe bar area again with nice landscaping and lighting.

Site 7: Agree residential would be best use of land here.

Site 8. Agree improvement required -again a nice brick building which has been is suffering from over signage.

Site 9. Definite NO to removing the library. The library is one of the few nice useful buildings in Stretford, replacing it with residential would be wasteful. The argument given appears weak.

Site 10. Drum - residential is ok.

The key themes of my points would be:

- Support and improve existing character buildings including the library.
- Improve landscaping and maintain
- Reduce signage significantly
- Radical facelift to Stretford Mall required

- Consider reducing Kingsway down

I have been a resident of Stretford for 35 years and all through that period Stretford Town Centre has suffered serious under-investment. The Town Centre has not recovered from the horrors of the 1960's when the heart was ripped out of the community and devastating major road schemes allowed to split the town centre into fragments.

I am therefore very pleased that at last it is acknowledged that the Town Centre needs re-planning. However, I am also very disappointed that the draft ideas for the Masterplan are so lacking in strategic vision and, as the old proverb still so aptly puts it, "where there is no vision, the people perish" – in this case the long-suffering people of Stretford. The strength of public concern was evident from the turnout at the recent consultation meeting at St Matthews Hall.

I would like to offer the following comments about the future of Stretford Town Centre with regard to the draft Masterplan:

- 1. Firstly, the overwhelming impression, when reading round the vague general statements included, is that the "strategy" is limited to identifying sites where the private sector can gain by redevelopment opportunities on a site by site basis. In other words there is no real strategy. This approach is compounded by an obvious desire to maximise the money that the Council can get by selling off what is left of the Stretford family jewels such as the Library building and the Civic Theatre. For a town that has suffered so much devastation in the past, it is vital to keep those buildings that retain the potential to give Stretford something of a character of its own and a basis for community identity the more so given the government's localism agenda and intention to give communities more say in their own destinies.
- 2. Secondly, the most fundamental requirement for establishing a true strategy and creating a sense of place and identity for Stretford is that the A56 must be put into a tunnel. The road not only splits the town centre in two physically but it acts as a major obstacle to a sense of community. It is a significant source of pollution and noise, as well as having a negative impact on the townscape of the area. Stretford is the only town centre in Trafford where the main assets are separated by a 6-lane highway on one side and a 4-lane highway along one other side. Much of the community is isolated from what should be its focal point.
- It is not enough to argue mere cost on this issue without also considering a full cost-benefit analysis. This is the last chance to get Stretford Town Centre right for decades and it must not be wasted. The undergrounding of the A56 must be put forward for investment at the earliest opportunity. I noted the great level of support for this idea at the consultation and I have given it a lot of thought subsequently. The potential benefits of such a scheme are enormous social, economic and environmental.
- 3. Following on from the above, it should be noted that many of the attractions and positive aspects of Stretford as a place are across the A56 from the Mall. Whilst the Mall itself needs significant investment to create a vibrant commercial, social and community centre, it will remain isolated unless it can be put into a direct context with the attractions and features the other side of the current A56. The Bridgewater Canal is of course a great plus point for Stretford. Potential for developments on the Sorting Office/car park site will be meaningless unless they relate to the canal and in turn link the canal to the Mall. Similarly, the Essoldo site and the two sites on the opposite side of the canal need to be considered all together with the promotion of the canal as a unifying theme. I accept that with sites in private ownership, it is sometimes difficult to achieve a unified theme, but the whole point about planning is to create a

plan for the public good into which private interests must be subsumed.

It is clearly folly to have both sites on the Metrolink side of the canal given over to housing with all the associated additional traffic generation at a point where pedestrians converge and cars and buses turn to park and manoeuvre. It would make more sense to have a unifying theme to the four corners sites at the point where Edge Lane crosses the canal – a theme to focus on the canal and maximise its potential. To this end, whilst there is a case for housing on the southern side of Edge Lane, the site on the northern side, currently informally linked to the boat moorings, should maintain a canal-based theme – perhaps a chandlers, information and interpretation centre, canal museum, café, and even a bike-hire/repair facility to link in with the Trans-Pennine trail and provide a service to those who cycle or would like to cycle to the station? Let's have a bit of flair and imagination to make the most of the area immediately around the station, which is after all a major transport hub and a point at which many people begin their experience of Stretford. It needs to be lively and to focus attention on the canal.

4. I note that two excellent parks within easy walking distance of the Mall are separated from it by major dual carriageways. This needs to be rectified. Victoria Park is mentioned in the draft plan, but Longford Park is not. Yet Longford Park is the biggest public park in Trafford – often described as the jewel in its crown. Moreover, it is a conservation area with a number of attractions that should be emphasised as a means of bringing people into the area both for sheer enjoyment and also to boost the local economy. If Longford Park could be better integrated into the Town Centre (by local signposting, publicity of events and facilities, and above all by getting rid of the A56 barrier) this would be a significant move in creating a truly exciting place.

Mention is made in the draft plan of Stretford Sports Village, but with the best will in the world this does not relate at all to the town centre. How this can be publicised while Longford Park is ignored escapes me. There has been recent successful investment in Longford Park, including a successful café, and this investment should be built upon in the context of Stretford Town Centre to draw people in.

5. This brings me back to the A56 and the need to put it into a tunnel before any real vision for Stretford can be achieved. Consider the advantages:

The road could enter the tunnel after the M60 bridge and reappear before the canal crossing with no visual detriment. The whole stretch of the existing 6-lane carriageway could be replaced by a single carriageway local distributor to be used by turning traffic, cycles and buses only.

The land freed up by this reduction in road width would be substantial and would offer great opportunities for additional development, as well as the creation of public spaces and landscaping. This would have economic benefits as well as social and environmental ones.

There would be a considerable reduction in the amount of traffic at ground level, with a consequent reduction in pollution and noise. There would be no significant barrier to prevent the Mall from being integrated with the rest of central Stretford, including the canal, the station and Longford Park, all of which could play their full part in creating the sense of identity that is essential for the establishment of a true community.

And so, in conclusion, the draft Masterplan is missing a once in a lifetime opportunity to produce a strategic vision for Stretford. The

key elements need to be:

Firstly: Putting the A56 into a tunnel. The long-term benefits –financial, from additional development land and increased economic and social activity; social, from creating a sense of place and a more attractive environment; and environmental, from less pollution and noise with increased landscaping – need to weighed against the short-term costs (bearing in mind that tunnelling is now much cheaper than it used to be, thanks to modern technology).

Secondly, key public buildings that remain from before the decimation in the 1960s need to be retained in public ownership and put to effective community use.

Thirdly, the four sites around the crossing point of Edge Lane with the Canal need to be planned coherently to provide a focal point for the canal and canal-based activities.

Fourthly, the potential of the canal as an attraction in itself needs to be maximised.

Fifthly, the corridor between Longford Park and the Mall (including the Metrolink station and the development sites around it) needs to be strengthened and unified.

Sixthly, Victoria Park and Longford Park need to be linked better – physically and functionally - to the rest of the town centre. Finally, the Mall itself needs to become a mixed commercial/community/social (and residential?) entity. Additional space freed up by undergrounding the A56 could be used to develop the centre appropriately, providing it with a more acceptable public façade and links to external public spaces.

I have already completed a survey for you in a rather rushed manner believing that the deadline was much sooner. The next few paragraphs will give more substance to the points I have already made in the survey.

I would very much like to underline the importance of the context of any redevelopment being taken in the light of the proud and important history of Stretford Town and the need for the Masterplan to ensure that the community of Stretford is catered for as a Town and NOT a dormitory / housing estate for Manchester. I would like, therefore, to set out some of the important historical background to Stretford as a crucial preliminary to my comments on the Masterplan.

I first came to this area prior to the re-organisation of local government and the creation of Trafford. I worked as a social worker for Lancashire County and was based in the then new offices at Arndale House but was very much aware, at the time, that Stretford was a place of importance – so much so that the Queen visited Longford Park for her Silver Jubilee - and hosted the only garden party here outside London. Since then we have lived with deterioration, destruction and neglect.

There are, however, possibilities for the future. I have recently heard, for instance, that there may be a possibility of Trafford's Park's Department submitting a Historical Lottery bid for the second time for Longford Park. As a founder member of Friends of Longford Park I am keen to see this happen – but believe that a more imaginative and creative approach would be to include the whole of Stretford in this bid. The Council need to act holistically on this across all departments.

The importance of John Rylands as one of the country's first multi-millionaires has been completely lost to this area. He was so important (and Manchester itself at the time!) that he was asked to be Lord Mayor of London but never particularly courted fame. He chose Stretford (an original crossing point of the Mersey) as his place of residence and created facilities for the people of Stretford like the Public Hall / Civic Theatre – which we still have - with its theatre as a basis for an arts centre - (and baths and other buildings etc which were pulled down to make way for the Arndale Centre).

There clearly are iconic architectural buildings like the Essoldo, the Library – (and even Arndale House!!!) from different eras too – as well as the obvious place for a historical transport hub – linking to the history of the railways and canals – which could potentially be included in any historical lottery bid. However, we should definitely not just look to the past. Indeed this history now provides the basis for the new tram system and a potential starting point for the Trans Pennine Trail. A canalside museum of transport development as well as a bike hire and repair facility would be ideal – with an emphasis on practical learning about both cycles and boats for young people. On account of the current transport links The Civic Theatre / Public Hall is in a suitable location to be developed for exhibitions etc...if the road were dealt with as suggested by Trafford Green Party.

The Masterplan provided by the council is completely unimaginative. It is not a Stretford Town Masterplan – but a method to merely allow the building of more and more residential units – without providing the facilities to build up a community again. With the proposed apartments in the former boatyard and at the Royal Canal Works a further 75 residential units will be created – when so much more could be done with the canalside for the benefit of all the residents of Stretford and potential visitors for the future. Longford Park is already linked by cycle route to the facilities in Manchester and more could potentially be made of links with the John Rylands Library. The vibrant café in Longford Park is already drawing people in to the area – and I believe the potential is enormous for the future.

As an aside, Longford Park has gained a first grant to begin to establish a Disc Golf course in the area, which will be capable of hosting major championships as well being accessible for all to play at no cost. There could be links with both other sports facilities like Trafford Athletics club, Trafford Wheelers all ability cycling, Lancashire County Cricket and the Sports hub as well as the involvement with local schools to creatively tackle anti-social behaviour in the area.

So the whole of the M32 area should be considered when looking at how Stretford Town can be developed. This clearly must be based upon the links with our industrial past – and in particular Trafford Park – some of which is within the M32 postcode. It is also crucial in difficult economic times like this that, as well as the potential for a historical lottery bid, we look at how business in those areas might facilitate and contribute to a revitalised Town for the future, which celebrates its past.
