1.0 Background

- 1.1 The Council has an extensive tree stock across the Borough that requires a form of continuous management and maintenance. There are trees present on council land including 18,000 highway trees, with 40Ha of woodland with a variety of species and trees in parks, open spaces and schools and in residential areas.
- 1.2 Trafford's Tree Policy has been in place for a number of years and required updating to ensure it meets with current tree management and maintenance principles and best practice. The Council has a duty under the Health and Safety at Work Act to have in place an effective system for managing trees that ensures trees do not present a risk to the public mainly from falling in their entirety or also from falling branches.
- 1.3 A range of relevant guidance has been produced by various organisations, including the National Tree Safety Group, the Arboricultural Association and the Forestry Commission. Their guidance provides advice to help duty holders such as Trafford to

comply with the Occupiers Liability Acts and other legislation relevant to trees. However, it should be noted that the guidance represents 'best practice' guidance for managing trees and each Authority is expected to have their own effective system for managing trees relevant to their land ownership and tree stock profile.

- 1.4 The updated Tree Management Policy 2023 covers how the Council will manage the tree stock in addition to ensuring that it is safe. The document also identifies how the council will respond to tree planting, requests for tree pruning, tree removal and other impacts that trees can have on the public, land or highway and endorses best practice procedures that have already been implemented as required during the life of the previous agreed policy.
- 1.5 Consultation on an updated Tree Management Principles document had been undertaken in June 2020. Due to the timing of this previous consultation coinciding with the onset of the pandemic there were no substantive responses received at that time. This policy has been reviewed following a subsequent audit of the service in 2021/22 and hence is also re-titled as a Policy document with more up to date information.

2.0 Other Options

2.1 The option to continue to manage trees referring to the existing policy was considered however, it does not address the current issues facing the longer term management and maintenance of trees.

3.0 Consultation

3.1 The Tree Management Policy will be published for consultation following approval by the Executive Member.

4.0 Reasons for Recommendation

4.1 The existing tree policy is out of date and requires updating to reflect current issues surrounding the management and maintenance of trees.
