Report Title: Data surveillance update paper to Public Engagement Board

Report Summary:

This paper provides an update on the current data position for COVID-19 within Trafford and provides comparative information with other GM localities. Data insights into any potential

trends are provided based on best available public health information and intelligence

available.

Overall position

As of November 6th, Trafford has the 40th highest rate of weekly covid cases per 100,000 population in England. Trafford's weekly incidence has plateaued over the last two weeks,

albeit at a very high rate. All of our wards all have a weekly incidence greater than 280/100,000 population, and four have rates of over 500/100,000 which shows the importance

of controlling transmission across the whole of Trafford, especially as we are still seeing

worryingly high rates in out 60+ population, and particularly residents 80 years and older. Our

key messages remain that we should all limit our social contacts, maintain social distancing,

and wash our hands thoroughly and regularly. These messages are especially important

throughout the period of this current lockdown, as this gives us the best chance of getting

infection rates down.



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1.0 Distribution of COVID-19 cases within Trafford

- 1.1 During the week 31 October 06 November, there were a total of 937 confirmed cases in Trafford, equivalent to a rate of 399 per 100,000 residents. During the previous week (23rd 29th October) there were a total of 928 cases, at a rate of 390.1 per 100,000 resident. The highest number of daily cases during week ending November 05 was 179, reported on November 2nd.
- 1.2 Below (figure 1) is the epidemic curve for Trafford, indicating the total number of confirmed cases and 7-day rolling average since March 2nd.
- 1.3 The rise in daily cases since the end of August is represented by the sharp rise in the 7-day rolling average; indicating that total cases per day have consistently stayed high throughout the month of September, going into October.
- 1.4 Throughout the first two weeks of October daily cases started to level out, however since week beginning October 19, Trafford experienced a sharp rise in daily cases, mostly greater than 150 confirmed cases per day.
- 1.5 The sharp rise in daily cases throughout the mid-part of October has been followed by a subsequent drop in the 7-day rolling average, which is 133 cases per day, and our weekly incidence rate to just under 400/100,000 population.




Figure 2. Incidence per 100,000 population by age and gender Trafford, 30th October to 05th November 2020

- 1.6 As of week ending 6th November, Trafford's 20-29 age group continue to have the highest incidence rates. We have however, as shown in figure 2, seen incidence rates in the remaining working age population increase to a similar rate to that of the 20-29 age group.
- 1.7 Incidence rates in our younger age groups (<20) haven't altered much over the previous two weeks, however rates have continued to drop in our 17-21 age group, with an incidence rate of 525.4/100,000 population (previously greater than 700/100,000 week ending October 25th).

- 1.8 As of November 05, total weekly cases in Trafford's 65+ population have exceeded 100 for the 3rd week in a row, with rates now greater than 350/100,000 population.
- 1.9 Of particular concern within the 60+ population is the high incidence rates that we are experiencing in residents 80 years and older. Among both males and females, the incidence rate in this age groups is over 400/100,000 population, with positive cases dispersed across all of Trafford's wards. These people are the most likely to become seriously ill if they catch Covid.
- 1.11 Trafford's 'White' ethnic group, as of week ending November 05, contribute to the highest number of cases (661), followed by the 'Asian / Asian British' ethnic group (109).
- 1.10 As shown in table 1, Incidence rates within the 'Other' and 'Asian / Asian British' populations are greatest. Incidence rates between each of Trafford's ethnic groups have remained relatively unchanged.

2.0 Geographical spread of COVID-19 in Trafford

- 2.1 We are still seeing the high rates of infection across the whole of Trafford, with four wards (Urmston, Davyhulme W, Hale Barns and Longford), all having a weekly incidence rate greater than 500/100,000 population week ending November 05.
- 2.2 All but two of Trafford's wards (Altrincham and Broadheath) have a weekly incidence less than 300/100,000 population, indicating that transmission is still widespread within the population.

3.0 Testing in Trafford

- 3.1 Over a 14 day period, ending November 08, the majority (91.1%) of COVID tests were conducted in our pillar 2 sites, consisting of all out-of-hospital testing sites. The proportion of tests being conducted in our pillar 1 testing sites has increased slightly.
- 3.2 Total positivity rate amongst both testing sites sits at 14%.
- 3.3 Over 90% of people who test positive state that they were symptomatic at the time of testing.

4.0 Comparative data of COVID-19 cases within the local authorities of Greater Manchester




Figure 3. Weekly incidence per 100,000 population by local authority Greater Manchester, 31 August to 07 November 2020

- 4.1 As presented in figure 3, the weekly incidence rate, since August 31, in each of GMs local authorities is either starting to level out or decrease; whilst the overall weekly incidence for England is showing a steady increase (however, the England rates remain lower than the incidence we are experiencing throughout GM).
- 4.2 As of week ending November 07, Trafford has the 9th lowest weekly incidence rate throughout the whole of GM.

Trafford

Report Summary:

This report outlines the progress made in community engagement and enforcement in the recent period in the local response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

1.0 Community Engagement

- 1.1 To support the Public Engagement Board in its duty to communicate simple and clear preventative measures to our staff, residents and local employers a weekly Covid-19 Co-ordination Engagement Group and a weekly COVID-19 Enforcement group are in place to ensure national guidance, legislation and COVID-19 best practice is implemented across the borough.
- 1.2 Teams have been working hard to ensure there is clear messaging for staff, residents, business and local employers to reflect the national lockdown position which came into effect on Thursday 05th November.

2.0 Key updates from the Co-ordination Engagement Group:

- 2.1 Environmental Health have been working with the Trafford Centre to ensure entrance to the Centre is well managed and long queues outside the building maintain social distancing, whilst customers inside the mall are compliant with COVID-19 regulations such as wearing face masks etc.
- 2.2 Comms was disseminated out in relation to bonfire night reminding that no official displays were allowed. Numerous reports were received about younger people setting off fireworks in parks. A "know where your children are" plea to parents is being prepared to facilitate the potential increase in gatherings in parks and house parties over the lockdown period.
- 2.3 Key Messages and information on COVID-19 has been developed for staff by the Public Health team to leverage the support of our 2,500 strong workforce and making sure 'Every Contact Counts'.
- 2.4 Parks and play areas will remain open and signage has been put in place in a number of open spaces across the borough reminding of the COVID-19 good practice.
- 2.5 A Facebook live event took place where there was a Q&A session with Trafford's Director or Public Health and Medical Director which was well attended by residents and members of the public.
- 2.6 An engagement event took place around Old Trafford with 15 local volunteers attended school gates and local Mosques to provide public health messaging and listen to community feedback. Consideration needs to be given to how we can better reach females and children within certain communities and how we ensure messaging is delivered via trusted voices (public health teams, community leaders, health professionals).
- 2.7 The team are reviewing video messaging and other materials on COVID-19 and working with the ICT team to build a COVID-19 landing page so there is a single point of access for up to date relevant information. Accessibility of information is key to our engagement strategy.

- 2.8 Mosque leaders continue to work hard to disseminate messages with their congregations via whatsapp messaging, radio systems, and youth volunteers particularly now congregations have been suspended in lockdown.
- 2.9 Stakeholder briefings updating on the national lockdown rules have been circulated by the Business, Community Safety and Partnerships and Communities teams.
- 2.10 Work with education partners is ongoing particularly in light of a significant increase in positivity rates in the schools and colleges ensuring there is access to immediate public health advice and up to date messaging on websites is available.
- 2.11 Ongoing communications work for staff and partners to reinforce messaging around restriction measures, local and national rules and good COVID-19 practice to ensure clarity of messaging.
- 2.12 The programme team have been working with Kent and Medway Council to learn about their community champion programme with a view to rolling out something similar in Trafford.
- 2.13 The partnerships team have been successful in receiving lottery funding and have recruited hub co-coordinators and volunteers which the team will work with to strengthen engagement activity.

3.0 Key updates from the Enforcement Group:

- 3.1 GMP undertook a number of visits of licensed premises and increased local patrols were sent out to respond to premises offering alcohol deals to get rid of stock prior to the national lockdown on Thursday 05th November.
- 3.2 The local lock down has meant shops are operating differently but many remain open with click and collect service operating increased footfall outside of premises is expected and needs to be managed.
- 3.3 Business offering take away alcohol have put some pressure on the enforcement team to ensure compliance is maintained. Reports of local coffee shops selling mulled wine but without pre-order have been reminded of the national rules.
- 3.4 Prohibition notice have been served to a number of local business who refused to close during the lockdown (carpet right and a gym Altrincham).
- 3.5 Complaints about local barbers and beauty related businesses continuing to trade during lockdown have been addressed by GMP.
- 3.6 Reports of gatherings within residential premises continue to be attended by GMP and the Community Safety Team. An increase in house gathering is anticipated moving into winter and in light of 4 week national lockdown. This will be difficult to regulate.
- 3.7 Increased neighbour complaints are expected as more people work at home and have late night gatherings in their houses and consideration is being given to avenues for residents and members of the public to report on rule breaches.

- 3.8 Officers from Licensing, GMP and Environmental Health continue to visit town centres to check current legislation is being adhered to and businesses, licensed premises, and residents understand what is required of them and where outbreaks occur business owners and managers are clear on expectations.
- 3.9 Work with GMP and UK Border Control on individuals or families in breach of the quarantine rules returning from certain countries continues.
