

DETAILS OF APPLICATION

- 1. Give rank or position of authorising officer in accordance with the Regulation of Investigatory Powers (Directed Surveillance and Covert Human Intelligence Sources) Order 2010 No. 521. 1
- 2. Describe the purpose of the specific operation or investigation.

To determine compliance with the law in respect of underage sales of alcohol from local licenced premises.

It is of both national and local concern to address the problem of underage sale of Alcohol and this is known to have a detrimental effect on young people's health as well as being the cause of anti-social behaviour.

The Licensing Act 2003 was approved by Parliament in July 2003. The overall aim of the Act is to modernise the legislation governing the sale and supply of alcohol and public entertainment. In carrying out its licensing functions the Licensing Authority will promote the following licensing objectives which are all of equal importance:

- 1) The prevention of crime and disorder;
- 2) Public safety;
- 3) The prevention of public nuisance;
- 4) The protection of children from harm.

These four objectives are paramount considerations at all times.

The protection of children from harm is a national licensing objective. The Act details a number of offences designed to protect children in licensed premises. The Licensing Authority is concerned to ensure that license holders of fixed premises or organisers of temporary events, create safe environments for children (in terms of their physical, moral and psychological welfare) who may be on the premises. Children should be unable to access alcohol or drugs and be subject to an appropriate level of care and supervision at all times. Trading Standards departments work closely with the Police and other agencies to ensure appropriate and efficient enforcement of the law, and promotion of best practice, in these respects.

The following are extracts from the Trading Standards North West - Report of Young Persons' Alcohol, Tobacco and E-Cigarette Survey 2017:

- 1) Analysis by age indicates that a slightly higher percentage of 14-16 year olds are buying alcohol themselves compared with two years ago.
- 2) Significant fall in percentage of young people claiming that they are asked for ID when buying alcohol themselves. Appears to be consistent across all regions.
- 3) There is a significant increase in those claiming to drink just to get drunk compared to two years ago.
- 4) Young people's understanding of the legislation regarding them buying and drinking alcohol appears to have fallen in the last two years.
- 3. Describe in detail the surveillance operation to be authorised and expected duration, including any premises, vehicles or equipment (e.g. camera, binoculars, recorder) that may be used.

¹ For local authorities: The exact position of the authorising officer should be given. For example, Head of Trading Standards.

Two volunteers aged under 18 will be accompanied throughout the exercise and to each of the listed premises by Trading Standard officers and police officers. They will be briefed beforehand as to what they must do, and the premises will be risk assessed prior to the visit. The volunteers will be instructed to enter the premises after 2 officers have already entered the premises, and have sent a message to officers waiting outside with the volunteers, saying it is safe to enter and suggesting what drinks to order. The officers inside will remain in a position where they can observe the volunteers at all times, and can intervene if necessary. If a sale of alcohol to the volunteers is refused, the volunteers will leave the premises and go to the officers waiting outside. The officers observing inside will leave shortly after. If a sale is made, the volunteers will take the drinks to near the officers observing who will photograph the volunteers with the drink, and make notebook notes as to what they have just seen. The volunteers will then leave the premises and go to the officers waiting outside and the officers present will conduct enquiries with the bar staff who sold the item and the owner/manager of the premises. It is not proposed to use any recording equipment during this exercise. Where premises are in close proximity to each other the officers will conduct enquiries with the bar staff and the owner/manager of the premises once all of the test purchases in the vicinity have been attempted so the identity of the volunteers is not revealed and therefore ensure the safety of the volunteers.

4. The identities, where known, of those to be subject of the directed surveillance.

The identities of persons to be subjected to the covert surveillance are not known but it will be staff and customers at the attached list of premises to be visited during the covert operation and people in the vicinity.

5. Explain the information that it is desired to obtain as a result of the directed surveillance.

This survey is intended to ensure the premises visited as detailed in the attached premises list are complying with current regulations and licence conditions in respect of alcohol sales.

Those premises who fail to comply with the Licensing Act 2003 by selling alcohol to those under the age of 18 will be reported for prosecution and a review of the premises licence will be considered.

6. Identify on which grounds the directed surveillance is <u>necessary</u> under Section 28(3) of RIPA. Delete those that are inapplicable. Ensure that you know which of these grounds you are entitled to rely on (SI 2010 No.521).

It is believed that this survey is necessary on the following statutory grounds:

- for the purpose of preventing or detecting crime or of preventing disorder.
- to investigate offences of selling alcohol to children.
- 7. Explain why this directed surveillance is necessary on the grounds you have identified [Code paragraph 3.3].

It is thought to be necessary and proportionate to what is sought to be achieved by carrying them out. This involves balancing the seriousness of the intrusion into the privacy of the subject of the operation (or any other person who may be affected) against the need for the activity in investigative and operational terms.

Trading Standards has a responsibility to investigate underage sales of age-restricted products, in this instance, alcohol.

Visiting premises with volunteer minors and using directed surveillance at the time is necessary to ascertain whether or not a licenced premise is selling or is likely to sell age restricted products contrary to current legislation which creates offences for such actions. Other options have been considered but there are no reasonable overt methods of enforcing this legislation.

8. Supply details of any potential collateral intrusion and why the intrusion is unavoidable. [Bear in mind Code paragraphs 3.8 to 3.11.]

Describe precautions you will take to minimise collateral intrusion.

There is a likelihood that surveillance may intrude into a third party's privacy, such as members of the public or staff at the bar or in the seating areas, or around the vicinity outside of the premises.

The intrusion is unavoidable because of the practicalities of the exercise. Any intrusion will be minimised by not using recording equipment and ensuring that the visit will be conducted as quickly and effectively as possible. The volunteers are instructed not to engage in conversation with members of staff (other than to place their drink order) or customers.

If a sale is made, the volunteers will be asked to leave the premises as soon as possible. If no sale is made they will leave the premises immediately and the accompanying officers will leave as soon as practicably possible.

9. Explain why this directed surveillance is proportionate to what it seeks to achieve. How intrusive might it be on the subject of surveillance or on others? And why is this intrusion outweighed by the need for surveillance in operational terms or can the evidence be obtained by any other means [Code paragraphs 3.4 to 3.7]?

There is currently a great deal of anti-social disorder in communities and much of it is known to be influenced by alcohol, and particularly due to consumption of alcohol by younger people. This is damaging and disruptive to communities as well as costly to enforcement and emergency services.

It is known from local intelligence and complaints received by enforcement agencies that some premises are not complying with regulations to not sell alcohol to anyone under 18 years of age. The only way to check for compliance is to do test purchases of age restricted product using minors. This sends a message out to the

communities that action is being undertaken by enforcement agencies, and also to the traders that the sale of alcohol to minors is not to be tolerated, and for traders who do it can lead to substantial penalties and/or licence revocation. Press releases regarding the outcome of the survey and any associated prosecutions or licence reviews also acts as a warning and deterrent for licence holders.

The directed surveillance is proportionate to what is trying to be achieved because we have a responsibility to reduce crime and disorder in the area, create a level playing field for traders and reduce the access young people have to alcohol.

Tackling underage sales of age restricted products is a statutory duty. These types of test purchases are recognised as being a well-established means of obtaining evidence for court purposes if necessary. Without adopting this method, there are no other ways of enforcing the legislation.

10. Confidential information [Code paragraphs 4.1 to 4.31].

INDICATE THE LIKELIHOOD OF ACQUIRING ANY CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION:

Customer and staff private conversations may be overheard by the volunteers and/or accompanying officers when inside and outside in the vicinity of the premises being tested. However, volunteers and officers are instructed not to engage in conversations other than to order drinks and to discuss any sales of alcohol with the seller, owner and manager of the premises.

A record will be made in the officer's notebooks of anything said in relation to any sale of alcohol but no written record will be made of any information not related to the sale of alcohol. Recording equipment is not being used. Any confidential information overheard will not be recorded and therefore not be retained.





Summary of details

In cooperation with Greater Manchester Police, Trafford Council's licencing enforcement officers intent to conduct test purchases using under age persons to establish whether the premises are causing or permitting the sale of alcohol to underage customers. The application is to be conducted in the presence of police officers and has been fully risk assessed as can be seen from both the application and the attached risk assessment. It is proposed to commence the operation on August 19, 2022. The internal authorisation permits, subject to judicial authority, the authorisation to remain in force for two months.

In the case of each of the premises identified above, intelligence received and collated by Greater Manchester Police and Trafford Council creates strong grounds to believe that the premises are the resort of underage persons to whom alcohol is sold or provided.

The specific intelligence is as follows:

Allegation that young clientele and 15 year olds drinking in the bar. GMP intelligence says the licensee entices young underage girls, as young as 14yrs, into the premises where he provides them with alcohol and food. If police conduct a visit to the licenced premises the girls will hide upstairs.

4. What is the nature of the business?

Punch is a multi-award-winning pub company in the UK with around 1,250 pubs in England, Scotland and Wales. The vast majority of these premises are either leased to tenants or contracted to operators under commercial agreements. In both cases the day-to-day management of the premises is undertaken by the publicans or partners, as we refer to them. The vision is to facilitate passionate local partners and publicans to run exceptional community pubs.

Each business is independently run by our publicans and partners under their agreements.

5. What is your understanding as to why you have received this letter?

We understand that this letter has been received following an alleged failed test purchase at the premises on Friday 19th August 2022 at the Garricks Head Public House, Moorside Road, Urmston, M41 5SH. In law it is an offence under S146 Licensing Act 2003 to sell alcohol to a person under 18 years of age.

We understand that this letter has been served on Punch ostensibly as the premises licence holders at the premises.

 Please provide details of the relationship / connection your Company has with The Garrick Public House, Moorside Road, Urmston, M41 5SH.

Punch own the premises. The premises is operated by Beer & Barrels Ltd under what is termed a partnership agreement, in this case signed on 26 May 2022. Under the agreement, it is for the partners to operate the premises, including hiring and managing staff.

The relationship therefore is at arms-length. There is no day-to-day control or management of the premises. That lies with our partners.

Information in relation to Licensing Act 2003

Please give details of measures put in place by your company to prevent the sale of alcohol to children.

Firstly, it is for the partner to operate the premises under their agreement and therefore to comply with all legal requirements including ensuring that staff are fully trained in the operator's policies and standards, including in relation to the prevention of under-age sales.

Punch, through the Punch Buyer's Club, make training materials available to all publicans and partners on a wide variety of topic and subjects, including age verification. However, it is our Partner who is responsible for nominating a DPS (who must be a personal licence holder) and it is the DPS who is responsible under law for supervising sales of alcohol at the premises.

8. What checks are made by your company to ensure these measures are being followed?

Under our agreements, publicans and partners have the right to operate their own businesses on a day-to-day basis. It is not the responsibility of Punch to oversee this and indeed there is limited input that can be had in to matters such as hiring and training of staff. Should there be significant breaches of the law, then this would likely constitute a breach of the agreement with Punch. It would then be for Punch to determine what action they would consider is permitted under that agreement in relation to that breach. Punch's recourse is through this relationship, rather than through direct management or oversight of the day-to-day operation of the premises.

9. Are you aware of Mr Joshua Barker? What is his role at The Garrick Public House?

We understand that he is employed by the Partner. For a definitive answer, please direct this question either to Mr Barker or the directors of Beer & Barrels Limited.

10. Please give details of any training and anything else provided to Mr Barker in relation to underage sales.

We would ask you to direct that question to either the DPS or the directors of Beer & Barrels Limited. Punch have not provided any direct training to Mr Barker as he is not an employee of Punch.

11. Do you have anything further comments to add?

Legal Position where the premises licence holder does not have day to day management of the premises

It is a matter of settled law that simply holding a premises licence does not make the holder responsible for any alleged unlawful trading.

The definitive case is Hall & Woodhouse v Borough and county of the Town of Poole [200] EWHC 1587 (Admin). In this case, the Appellant pub company Hall & Woodhouse, appealed a decision of the Magistrate Court to the High Court seeking clarification on whether licensing authorities (or responsible authorities) could prosecute the premises licence holders in situations where they were not in day-to-day control of the premises. in this case the alleged offence was under S136(1)(a) Licensing Act 2003- undertaking unauthorised licensable activities. However, we submit that the principle applies to S146 equally.

In Hall & Woodhouse, Lord Justice Richards stated:

(Para 17) 'In my judgment, section 136(1)(a) is directed at persons who, as a matter of fact, actually carry on or attempt to carry on a licensable activity on or from premises. That is the natural meaning of the language used. The matters referred to in subsection (2), namely performing a play, participating as a sportsman and so on, also suggest that the focus is on actual conduct. So does section 139(1) which gives a person a defence where his act was due to a mistake etc. and he took all reasonable precautions and exercised all due diligence to avoid committing the offence.

(Para 18) Section 136(1)(a) is not directed at holders of premises licences as such. An offence may be committed by carrying on a licensable activity when no premises licence exists at all. Where there is a premises licence but a licensable activity is carried on outside the scope of that licence or in breach of the conditions of the licence, it must, in my view, be a question of fact whether it is carried on by the holder of the licence. The mere fact that he is the holder of a licence does not make him automatically liable in respect of the carrying of a licensable activity on or from the premises to which the licence relates.

(Para 22)... 'As I have said, I think it clear that section 136(1)(a) is concerned with actual conduct and whether a person has, as a matter of fact, carried out a licensable activity in breach of the provision.'

On this basis, we would respectfully suggest that allegations relating to an offence under S146 Licensing Act 2003 are more properly raised with the person alleged to have committed the offence, the DPS, or the day-to-day operators of the premises- in this case Beer & Barrels Limited.

We will, of course, continue to work with the responsible authorities wherever possible to ensure that premises within the Punch estate trade within the law, subject, it goes without saying, to the constraints placed on Punch by the nature of the relationship with our publicans and partners.

DETAILS OF APPLICATION

- Give rank or position of authorising officer in accordance with the Regulation of Investigatory Powers (Directed Surveillance and Covert Human Intelligence Sources) Order 2010 No. 521.¹
- 2. Describe the purpose of the specific operation or investigation.

To determine compliance with the law in respect of underage sales of alcohol from local licenced premises.

It is of both national and local concern to address the problem of underage sale of Alcohol and this is known to have a detrimental effect on young people's health as well as being the cause of anti-social behaviour.

The Licensing Act 2003 was approved by Parliament in July 2003. The overall aim of the Act is to modernise the legislation governing the sale and supply of alcohol and public entertainment. In carrying out its licensing functions the Licensing Authority will promote the following licensing objectives which are all of equal importance:

- 1) The prevention of crime and disorder;
- 2) Public safety;
- 3) The prevention of public nuisance;
- 4) The protection of children from harm.

These four objectives are paramount considerations at all times.

The protection of children from harm is a national licensing objective. The Act details a number of offences designed to protect children in licensed premises. The Licensing Authority is concerned to ensure that licence holders of fixed premises or organisers of temporary events, create safe environments for children (in terms of their physical, moral and psychological welfare) who may be on the premises. Children should be unable to access alcohol or drugs and be subject to an appropriate level of care and supervision at all times. Trading Standards departments work closely with the Police and other agencies to ensure appropriate and efficient enforcement of the law, and promotion of best practice, in these respects.

The following are extracts from the Trading Standards North West - Report of Young Persons' Alcohol, Tobacco and E-Cigarette Survey 2017:

- 1) Analysis by age indicates that a slightly higher percentage of 14-16 year olds are buying alcohol themselves compared with two years ago.
- 2) Significant fall in percentage of young people claiming that they are asked for ID when buying alcohol themselves. Appears to be consistent across all regions.
- 3) There is a significant increase in those claiming to drink just to get drunk compared to two years ago.
- 4) Young people's understanding of the legislation regarding them buying and drinking alcohol appears to have fallen in the last two years.
- 3. Describe in detail the surveillance operation to be authorised and expected duration, including any premises, vehicles or equipment (e.g. camera, binoculars, recorder) that may be used.

¹ For local authorities: The exact position of the authorising officer should be given. For example, Head of Trading Standards.

Two volunteers aged under 18 will be accompanied throughout the exercise and to each of the listed premises by Trading Standard officers and police officers. They will be briefed beforehand as to what they must do, and the premises will be risk assessed prior to the visit. The volunteers will be instructed to enter the premises after 2 officers have already entered the premises, and have sent a message to officers waiting outside with the volunteers, saying it is safe to enter and suggesting what drinks to order. The officers inside will remain in a position where they can observe the volunteers at all times, and can intervene if necessary. If a sale of alcohol to the volunteers is refused, the volunteers will leave the premises and go to the officers waiting outside. The officers observing inside will leave shortly after. If a sale is made, the volunteers will take the drinks to near the officers observing who will photograph the volunteers with the drink, and make notebook notes as to what they have just seen. The volunteers will then leave the premises and go to the officers waiting outside and the officers present will conduct enquiries with the bar staff who sold the item and the owner/manager of the premises. It is not proposed to use any recording equipment during this exercise. Where premises are in close proximity to each other the officers will conduct enquiries with the bar staff and the owner/manager of the premises once all of the test purchases in the vicinity have been attempted so the identity of the volunteers is not revealed and therefore ensure the safety of the volunteers.

The following premises will be visited due to the information / intelligence outlined below:
1. GMP intel, sale to under 18 - possibly proxy sale.
2. The Garrick, Moorside Road, Urmston M41 5SH - GMP have received two reports of underage sales. We have received 3 complaints 102386, 102868 and 103161 selling alcohol to under 18s. Premises sold to our volunteers in August 2022.
3. The seller from the Garrick is now working there and it also appears the DPS from the Garrick has some connection with the premises.
GMP intel: PS has stopped at the weekend some known males to him 16-17 years of age, they were on their way to saying they go down most weekends and try and get into one of the bars they often manage to get into one. Large numbers of young males/females in the area - cctv footage which shows concerns over the apparent ages of some of these people in the clubs.
5. — just outside — area which attracts young people and on previous UAS survey there appeared to be a very young clientele on and outside the premises. Also previous intel has indicated young clientele on premises.
6 just outside area which attracts young people and on previous survey there appeared to be a very young clientele on and outside the premises.

8. again just outside a sew premises currently operating under TENs and attracting a young crowd.

5. Explain the information that it is desired to obtain as a result of the directed surveillance.

This survey is intended to ensure the premises visited as detailed in the attached premises list are complying with current regulations and licence conditions in respect of alcohol sales.

Those premises who fail to comply with the Licensing Act 2003 by selling alcohol to those under the age of 18 will be reported for prosecution and a review of the premises licence will be considered.

Identify on which grounds the directed surveillance is necessary under Section 28(3) of RIPA. Delete those that are inapplicable. Ensure that you know which of these grounds you are entitled to rely on (SI 2010 No.521).

It is believed that this survey is necessary on the following statutory grounds:

- for the purpose of preventing or detecting crime or of preventing disorder.
- to investigate offences of selling alcohol to children.

7. Explain why this directed surveillance is necessary on the grounds you have identified [Code paragraph 3.3].

It is thought to be necessary and proportionate to what is sought to be achieved by carrying them out. This involves balancing the seriousness of the intrusion into the privacy of the subject of the operation (or any other person who may be affected) against the need for the activity in investigative and operational terms.

Trading Standards has a responsibility to investigate underage sales of age-restricted products, in this instance, alcohol.

Visiting premises with volunteer minors and using directed surveillance at the time is necessary to ascertain whether or not a licenced premise is selling or is likely to sell age restricted products contrary to current legislation which creates offences for such actions. Other options have been considered but there are no reasonable overt methods of enforcing this legislation.

8. Supply details of any potential collateral intrusion and why the intrusion is unavoidable. [Bear in mind Code paragraphs 3.8 to 3.11.]

Describe precautions you will take to minimise collateral intrusion.

There is a likelihood that surveillance may intrude into a third party's privacy, such as members of the public or staff at the bar or in the seating areas, or around the vicinity outside of the premises.

The intrusion is unavoidable because of the practicalities of the exercise. Any intrusion will be minimised by not using recording equipment and ensuring that the visit will be conducted as quickly and effectively as possible. The volunteers are instructed not to engage in conversation with members of staff (other than to place their drink order) or customers.

If a sale is made, the volunteers will be asked to leave the premises as soon as possible. If no sale is made they will leave the premises immediately and the accompanying officers will leave as soon as practicably possible.

9. Explain why this directed surveillance is proportionate to what it seeks to achieve. How intrusive might it be on the subject of surveillance or on others? And why is this intrusion outweighed by the need for surveillance in operational terms or can the evidence be obtained by any other means [Code paragraphs 3.4 to 3.7]?

There is currently a great deal of anti-social disorder in communities and much of it is known to be influenced by alcohol, and particularly due to consumption of alcohol by younger people. This is damaging and disruptive to communities as well as costly to enforcement and emergency services.

It is known from local intelligence and complaints received by enforcement agencies that some premises are not complying with regulations to not sell alcohol to anyone under 18 years of age. The only way to check for compliance is to do test purchases of age restricted product using minors. This sends a message out to the communities that action is being undertaken by enforcement agencies, and also to the traders that the sale of alcohol to minors is not to be tolerated, and for traders who do it can lead to substantial penalties and/or licence revocation. Press releases regarding the outcome of the survey and any associated prosecutions or licence reviews also acts as a warning and deterrent for licence holders.

The directed surveillance is proportionate to what is trying to be achieved because we have a responsibility to reduce crime and disorder in the area, create a level playing field for traders and reduce the access young people have to alcohol.

Tackling underage sales of age restricted products is a statutory duty. These types of test purchases are recognised as being a well-established means of obtaining evidence for court purposes if necessary. Without adopting this method, there are no other ways of enforcing the legislation.

Customer and staff private conversations may be overheard by the volunteers and/or accompanying officers when inside and outside in the vicinity of the premises being tested. 

- 13. Explain why you believe the directed surveillance is necessary [Code paragraph 3.3].
 Explain why you believe the directed surveillance to be proportionate to what is sought to be achieved by carrying it out [Code paragraphs 3.4 to 3.7].
- 1. I am satisfied that directed surveillance in the form of covert test purchasing is the only realistic, proportionate method of investigating the allegations that underage sales are taking place at each of the venues identified within the application. The likely outcome is either that the allegations will not be made out, in which case the premises licence holder can be informed of the results of the test purchasing exercise, or that the allegations will be made out and sufficient evidence will be obtained to provide for prosecution or a premises licence review. The is a clear public interest in preventing underage sales taking place for the protection of children and young persons and for the prevention of anti-social behaviour with which such underage sales are frequently associated.
- 2. I am satisfied that risk assessments that have been undertaken and the measures that have been put in place provide an adequate level of protection to the underage volunteers and the officers involved.
- 3. I do not consider that there is any material risk of collateral intrusion that would lead to the acquisition of personal information pertaining to third parties in circumstances where the authorised activity is limited to an attempt to make an underage purchase of alcohol and no personal information relating to any third party is sought or recorded.

Please find below our response to your questions in relation to the alleged failed test purchase at the above premises.

We have provided this response on behalf of the premises licence holder Punch Taverns Limited ('Punch'). This is not a response on behalf of the operator of the premises, their employees, agents or advisers.

Further, Punch accept no liability on behalf of the operator of the premises, their employees, agents or advisers.

Response to questions

Business information

1. Please confirm the legal trading name of Punch Taverns and if it is a Limited company please confirm the company number and registered office address?

The premises licence is held in the name of Punch Taverns Limited. Jubilee House, Second Avenue, Burton Upon Trent, Staffordshire, DE14 2WF Company number 03752645

2. Please confirm what your position is within the company of Punch Taverns.

Tom Harvey Head of Legal – Property. For the avoidance of doubt I have relied upon my own investigations internally and legal advice in producing this response.

3. Please can you confirm that you are authorised to speak on behalf of the company.

4. What is the nature of the business?

Punch is a multi-award-winning pub company in the UK with around 1,250 pubs in England, Scotland and Wales. The vast majority of these premises are either leased

to tenants or contracted to operators under commercial agreements. In both cases the day-to-day management of the premises is undertaken by the publicans or partners, as we refer to them. The vision is to facilitate passionate local partners and publicans to run exceptional community pubs.

Each business is independently run by our publicans and partners under their agreements.

5. What is your understanding as to why you have received this letter?

We understand that this letter has been received following an alleged failed test purchase at the premises on 22nd December 2022. We understand that a visit were made by two volunteers aged under 18 to premises. The volunteers entered The Garrick public house ('The Premises'), at approximately 19:45pm and were sold 1 bottle of Corona and 1 bottle of WKD. We further understand that the seller has been identified as Joshua Barker. We are aware that a previous sale of alcohol had been made on 19th August 2022 to two different volunteers aged under 18 by Joshua Barker at The Premises.

We understand that this letter has been served on Punch ostensibly as the premises licence holders at the premises.

6. Please provide details of the relationship / connection your Company has with The Garrick Public House, Moorside Road, Urmston, M41 5SH.

Punch own the premises. The premises is operated by Beer & Barrels Ltd under what is termed a partnership agreement, in this case signed on 26 May 2022. Under the agreement, it is for the partners to operate the premises, including hiring and managing staff.

The relationship therefore is at arms-length. There is no day-to-day control or management of the premises. That lies with our partners.

Information in relation to Licensing Act 2003

7. Please give details of measures put in place by your company to prevent the sale of alcohol to children.

Firstly, it is for the partner to operate the premises under their agreement and therefore to comply with all legal requirements including ensuring that staff are fully trained in the operator's policies and standards, including in relation to the prevention of underage sales.

Punch, through the Punch Buyer's Club, make training materials available to all publicans and partners on a wide variety of topic and subjects, including age verification. However, it is our Partner who is responsible for nominating a DPS (who must be a personal licence holder) and it is the DPS who is responsible under law for supervising sales of alcohol at the premises.

Following the first failed test purchase, we investigated matters and reiterated to our partners the importance of training staff and reminding them of their responsibilities. We were given assurances that this had been done.

8. What checks are made by your company to ensure these measures are being followed?

Under our agreements, publicans and partners have the right to operate their own businesses on a day-to-day basis. It is not the responsibility of Punch to oversee this and indeed there is limited input that can be had in to matters such as hiring and training of staff. Should there be significant breaches of the law, then this would likely constitute a breach of the agreement with Punch. It would then be for Punch to determine what action they would consider is permitted under that agreement in relation to that breach. Punch's recourse is through this relationship, rather than through direct management or oversight of the day-to-day operation of the premises.

9. Are you aware of Mr Joshua Barker? What is his role at The Garrick Public House?

We understand that he is employed by the Partner. For a definitive answer, please direct this question either to Mr Barker or the directors of Beer & Barrels Limited.

We understand that following the second failed test purchase he has had his employment terminated. This response is without prejudice to the rights of any party to raise defences under \$146 (4) or (6) of the Licensing Act in relation to either failed test purchase.

10. Please give details of any training and anything else provided to Mr Barker in relation to underage sales.

We would ask you to direct that question to either the DPS or the directors of Beer & Barrels Limited. Punch have not provided any direct training to Mr Barker as he is not an employee of Punch.

Further information

11. Do you have anything further comments to add?

Legal Position where the premises licence holder does not have day to day management of the premises

It is a matter of settled law that simply holding a premises licence does not make the holder responsible for any alleged unlawful trading.

The definitive case is Hall & Woodhouse v Borough and county of the Town of Poole [200] EWHC 1587 (Admin). In this case, the Appellant pub company Hall & Woodhouse, appealed a decision of the Magistrate Court to the High Court seeking clarification on whether licensing authorities (or responsible authorities) could prosecute the premises licence holders in situations where they were not in day-to-day control of the premises. in this case the alleged offence was under \$136(1)(a) Licensing Act 2003- undertaking unauthorised licensable activities. However, we submit that the principle applies to \$146 equally.

In Hall & Woodhouse, Lord Justice Richards stated:

(Para 17) 'In my judgment, section 136(1)(a) is directed at persons who, as a matter of fact, actually carry on or attempt to carry on a licensable activity on or from premises. That is the natural meaning of the language used. The matters referred to in subsection (2), namely performing a play, participating as a sportsman and so on, also suggest that the focus is on actual conduct. So does section 139(1) which gives a person a defence where his act was due to a mistake etc. and he took all reasonable precautions and exercised all due diligence to avoid committing the offence.

(Para 18) 'Section 136(1)(a) is not directed at holders of premises licences as such. An offence may be committed by carrying on a licensable activity when no premises licence exists at all. Where there is a premises licence but a licensable activity is carried on outside the scope of that licence or in breach of the conditions of the licence, it must, in my view, be a question of fact whether it is carried on by the holder of the licence. The mere fact that he is the holder of a licence does not make him automatically liable in respect of the carrying of a licensable activity on or from the premises to which the licence relates.

(Para 22)... 'As I have said, I think it clear that section 136(1)(a) is concerned with actual conduct and whether a person has, as a matter of fact, carried out a licensable activity in breach of the provision.'

On this basis, we would respectfully suggest that allegations relating to an offence under \$146 Licensing Act 2003 are more properly raised with the person alleged to

have committed the offence, the DPS, or the day-to-day operators of the premisesin this case Beer & Barrels Limited.

We will, of course, continue to work with the responsible authorities wherever possible to ensure that premises within the Punch estate trade within the law, subject, it goes without saying, to the constraints placed on Punch by the nature of the relationship with our publicans and partners.

It is sad to hear that someone has lost their job; but in this case we support the action that has been taken by our partners. Staff need to understand that they must ensure there are no sales of alcohol to under 18's. It is our experience, however, that some individuals for whatever reason, do not seem capable of undertaking the necessary age verification checks and in such a case cannot therefore work where such checks are a necessary part of the role.

Punch Pubs reserve the right to take further action against our Partner should circumstances lead us to believe that there was a fundamental failing on their part in relation to these sales. We would welcome any input that the council may have following their investigations in this regard.
